About the Play

Successful politician Sir Robert Chiltern has it all – money, power and the love of his adoring wife. But when a mysterious character threatens to expose a dark secret from his past, he becomes hopelessly embroiled in a world of insider trading, blackmail and deception.

About the Playwright

Born in 1854 in Dublin, Wilde was the son of an ear surgeon and a poet. Wilde sailed for America in 1881 on a successful lecture tour celebrating art for art's sake. He married Constance Lloyd in 1884, and the couple raised two sons in London. Wilde wrote widely, including journalism, critical essays and short stories. Wilde's only novel, The Picture of Dorian Gray, was first published in 1890. The following decade saw Wilde's maturity and success as a playwright, with productions of Lady Windermere's Fan, A Woman of No Importance, An Ideal Husband and The Importance of Being Earnest mocking and delighting high society audiences. Wilde's private life became a public scandal in 1895 when he was arrested on charges of 'gross indecency' for his relationship with Lord Alfred Douglas, nicknamed Bosie. Wilde was sentenced to two years' imprisonment with hard labour, and later died from meningitis in 1900.

Do you think the themes of blackmail and political corruption are still relevant in 2018? Identify some recent events to support your argument.


