Melbourne Theatre Company Artistic Director Brett Sheehy Ao today revealed MTC's 2016 Season - a year of remarkable theatre, entertainment and activity at Victoria's home of live storytelling.

'2016 marks the fourth Melbourne Theatre Company Season I've had the great privilege to curate,' Brett Sheehy said. 'Navigating a theatre company through this second decade of the 21st Century is both a joy and a challenge as we strive to achieve the right balance of stories and art which excites our loyal, intrepid subscribers and also speaks to new audiences about their lives in an arresting and compelling way.'

'In this 2016 program I believe we have found a perfect mix of works - a suite of plays which can speak with great meaning to any of the six million citizens of our State. The combination of exciting Australian premieres of the best new international plays, world premieres of fresh Australian works, and new productions of much-loved classics guarantees there is something on offer that will entertain, challenge and enlighten all our lives, and enable us to see the world in original and enriching ways,' Mr Sheehy said.

MTC's 2016 Season features 11 mainstage plays, a family production, NEON NEXT, an extensive Education Program, the Cybec Electric play reading series, a Women in Theatre program, regional and interstate touring, MTC CONNECT and a range of other artist development initiatives.

Gracing MTC's stages in 2016 are a host of celebrated actors including Kat Stewart, Shaun Micallef, Colin Friels, Kate Atkinson, Bert LaBonté, Mark Leonard Winter, Sarah Peirse, Christen O'Leary, Bobby Fox, and Ash Flanders; and award-winning directors including Kip Williams, Nadia Tass, Simon Phillips, Clare Watson, Peter Houghton, Sarah Goodes, MTC's Associate Artistic Director Sam Strong and Associate Director Leticia Cáceres.

These artists will be bringing to life works by some of the finest writers from Australia and abroad including Joanna Murray-Smith, Kate Mulvany, Tom Holloway, Carolyn Burns, Young Jean Lee, Duncan Macmillan, Deborah Bruce, Ayad Akhtar, David Hare, Neil Simon and August Strindberg.

MTC's 2016 Season opens in stylish fashion with Ladies in Black, a new musical which features music and lyrics by Tim Finn and sees the return of the creative masterminds behind North by Northwest, Simon Phillips and Carolyn Burns.

Kate Atkinson and Bert LaBonté star in the Australian premiere of Lungs, a funny, tender and profound two-hander by British writer Duncan Macmillan, directed by Clare Watson.

MTC Associate Director Leticia Cáceres leads the Australian premiere of *The Distance*, a smash-hit from London with big laughs and moral dilemmas that examine the emotional fallout when a woman walks out on her husband and children.

2015 Helpmann award-winning director Kip Williams brings the theatrical masterpiece Miss Julie to MTC for a modern revival, starring the inimitable Mark Leonard Winter, fresh from his acclaimed performance in Birdland.

Straight White Men, the razor-edged new comedy from one of American theatre's most acute observers of race and identity, Young Jean Lee, is taken on by MTC Associate Director Leticia Cáceres.

One of the greatest crime novels of our times, Double Indemnity, is given a brilliant stage adaptation by Tom Holloway with direction by MTC Associate Artistic Director Sam Strong.

Led by award-winning director Dean Bryant, David Hare's contemporary classic Skylight returns to MTC starring Colin Friels and Anna Samson as the estranged lovers who reunite and old passion sparks.

Kat Stewart and Mitchell Butel star in Disgraced, the 2013 Pulitzer Prize-winning drama that proves politics and dinner parties are never a good mix, directed by Nadia Tass.

Joanna Murray-Smith's acclaimed two-hander, Switzerland, comes to MTC with the stunning original Sydney Theatre Company team of actors Sarah Peirse and Eamon Farren, and director Sarah Goodes.

And MTC's 2016 mainstage season closes with Shaun Micallef and Francis Greenslade playing the famous mismatched duo in comedy classic The Odd Couple, directed by Peter Houghton.

In addition to the mainstage productions, MTC continues its commitment to family programming with Egg, a world premiere co-production with Terrapin Puppet Theatre, from acclaimed creative team Angela Betzien and Leticia Cáceres.

Also in 2016, MTC's NEON Festival evolves into NEON NEXT - an incubator for commissioning, developing and presenting independent works for the stage. NEON NEXT sees Sisters Grimm return to the Company with their new production Lilith: The Jungle Girl, commissioned and presented by MTC, and Daniel Schlusser and Nicola Gunn commence work on new commissions. Throughout the year NEON NEXT will also provide opportunities for independent theatre practitioners to take part in free professional development workshops and masterclasses.

MTC's award-winning Education Program continues with a brand new work for VCE students, along with a range of unique learning opportunities and resources for students and teachers. Peddling by Harry Melling will make its Australian premiere as MTC's Education production, and will tour to regional Victoria and Tasmania after its season at Southbank Theatre. In 2016, MTC's Sharing the Light initiative, supported by Crown Resorts Foundation, enters its second year, enriching the lives of young people throughout the state with subsidised \$5 tickets for eligible schools and families, an Indigenous Scholarship Program and a regional tour of MTC's Education production.

Alongside the work taking place on MTC's stages, the successful Cybec Electric play reading series returns, as do MTC's many initiatives designed to foster, develop and support the creative talent of Australian artists. These initiatives include the Assistant Directors Program, MTC Commissions, MTC CONNECT and the Women in Theatre Program - an expansion of MTC's Women Directors Program to embrace all areas of the theatre industry.

Brett Sheehy said, 'There's no shortage of remarkable theatrical experiences, activities and learning opportunities at MTC in 2016. In addition to presenting a program of exceptional theatre we continue to nurture the individuals who make up the creative industry we are so lucky to have in this country.'

A Queensland Theatre Company Production. Originally produced by Queensland Theatre Company in association with Queensland Performing Arts Centre Melbourne Theatre Company opens its 2016 season in glittering fashion with the stylish musical Ladies in Black, a celebration of glamour, gowns and growing up in 1950s Australia. Adapted from the Madeleine St John novel The Women in Black and brought to life by director Simon Phillips with songs by Tim Finn (Split Enz, Crowded House), this QTC production opens on Wednesday 20 January at Southbank Theatre, The Sumner.

With a stellar cast including Christen O'Leary (The Boy from Oz) and Bobby Fox (Jersey Boys), Ladies in Black brings writer Carolyn Burns and director Simon Phillips back to MTC fresh from their triumphant stage adaptation of North by Northwest.

Director Simon Phillips said, 'It's always great to work on a brand new piece, but this one has so many ingredients that I love, that it promises to be really special. The original novel is a rare jewel, a funny and life-affirming tale that turns small lives into a captivating page-turner and Carolyn's adaptation perfectly and economically catches its charm and the poetry of its intertwining narratives. Add to that the wonderful, witty melodies of Tim's score - from laconic bush ballads to soaring, romantic odes to fashion and possibility - and you have a heady mix, a theatrical event with its own beguiling, twinkly-eyed style.'

In 1950s Sydney when the city is on the cusp of becoming cosmopolitan, young high school graduate Lesley takes a holiday job at Goodes, the most prestigious department store in town. In that summer of innocence, a world of possibilities opens up as she befriends the ladies of the women's frocks department - including her new mentor, the exotic European Magda, mysterious mistress of the gowns.

Carolyn Burns began her career in New Zealand, devising and writing the comedy-thriller for children, The Retrievers. Her first play for adults, Objection Overruled, was performed in all major New Zealand theatres. After moving to Australia, she worked as a journalist with SBS, before attending the screenwriting course at AFTRS and writing for ABC TV. She later wrote four plays, including adapting both Haxby's Circus and High Society for the stage. Since then, Carolyn has worked as a dramaturg and script editor, and is currently collaborating on a number of new works for the stage.

Tim Finn OBE is a highly acclaimed singer and songwriter whose illustrious career began with the group he co-founded in the early 1970s, Split Enz. Tim has also enjoyed great success as a solo artist and as a collaborator with his brother Neil Finn, both during his tenure with Crowded House and as musical duo Finn Brothers. In 2009, Tim collaborated with playwright Matt Cameron on Poor Boy which premiered at MTC. It was directed by Simon Phillips, and featured songs taken from a range of Tim's albums. Tim is currently under commission by the Western Australian Opera, Victorian Opera and New Zealand Opera to write Star Navigator, which will tour throughout Australia and New Zealand in 2016.

Award-winning director Simon Phillips was MTC's Artistic Director from 2000 to 2011. Among his many MTC credits are North by Northwest, Pennsylvania Avenue, The Importance of Being Earnest, Hamlet, Richard III, The Drowsy Chaperone, August: Osage County, Festen, The Blue Room, Proof, and High Society, which also had a successful UK production. Simon has also worked extensively with companies internationally and around Australia, including STCSA where he was Artistic Director from 1990 to 1993. On the commercial stage, his productions include Priscilla - Queen of the Desert, the Musical, Andrew Lloyd Webber's Love Never Dies and Eat, Pray, Laugh - Barry Humphries' farewell tour, all of which have had various international seasons.





Kate Atkinson (Wentworth, The Waiting Room) and Bert LaBonté (Birdland, The Mountaintop) star in Lungs, a funny, tender and profound new play by British writer Duncan Macmillan. Bringing our uncertainties and unspoken thoughts about the future into full voice, Lungs makes its Australian premiere on Thursday 11 February at Arts Centre Melbourne, Fairfax Studio.

Clare Watson returns to MTC following the success of What Rhymes with Cars and Girls to direct this modern romantic drama that proves parenthood is not for the fainthearted.

Director Clare Watson said, 'I'm thrilled to be returning to MTC with Lungs, it's a play that is both hilarious and devastating. This couple are bitingly witty, they banter and riff off one another but their fundamental question is bleak: if the planet stands a chance, shouldn't humans stop making more humans?'

In Ikea - of all places - a man tentatively suggests to his partner that perhaps they should start a family, and whoosh - out fly all her pent up anxieties for the future. What follows is months of this couple's unending questioning of their impending parenthood compressed into one seamless, funny conversation. And while they fret and bicker over the biggest decision of their lives, the real question becomes whether there's enough love in the mix to hold things together.

Clare Watson made her MTC mainstage directing debut with the critically acclaimed What Rhymes with Cars and Girls in 2015. Previously, she had worked with the Company as Assistant Director on Rupert in 2013 and directed On the Production of Monsters for the 2012 Lawler Studio season. Clare is the Artistic Director of St Martins Youth Arts Centre. In 2014, she was director in Residence at Malthouse Theatre and she is an MTC Women Directors Program alumna. Her stage credits include I Heart John McEnroe (Uninvited Guests/Theatre Works); The Man with the September Face (Full Tilt/Arts Centre); Smashed (Stables); and Hotel (Melbourne Fringe Festival).

Duncan Macmillan is a UK-based, multi-award-winning writer, who has written extensively for theatre in addition to working in radio, television and film. His work for the stage includes Monster; the acclaimed adaptation of George Orwell's 1984, which will play at the 2015 Melbourne Festival; and adaptations of Reise durch die Nacht, Don Juan Comes Back from the War and Eugene Onegin. For radio Duncan's work includes I Wish to Apologise for My Part in the Apocalypse, So Say All of Us and Family Tree (all BBC).

MTC Associate Director Leticia Cáceres directs The Distance by Deborah Bruce, a play with big laughs and moral dilemmas that expose one of society's final taboos. Starring Susan Prior, this smash-hit from London makes its Australian premiere on Thursday 10 March at Southbank Theatre, The Sumner.

Drawing similarities to Ibsen's A Doll's House, The Distance explores society's revered view of motherhood and the emotional fallout of a major domestic upheaval when a woman walks out on her husband and children.

Director Leticia Cáceres said, 'With great humour and emotional intelligence, Deborah Bruce has written one of the best new plays to come out of Britain in the past year. Whether you are a parent or not, The Distance has universal themes of friendship, family and the anguish of adult responsibilities that everyone can relate to. It's a wild ride of emotions, laughs and surprising honesty.'

Turn to your friends in times of trouble. That's sound advice and just what Bea does after leaving her marriage in Australia and returning to Britain. All her friends sympathise with her until she announces that her two small children will stay in Melbourne with their father. She's not cut out for motherhood. Doesn't like it one bit. So why should she pretend? She's flown the coop and there's no way this pigeon is flying back.

Deborah Bruce is a celebrated director-turned-playwright from London whose career spans 20 years. Her contemporary works include Godchild (Hampstead Theatre), and Same (National Theatre Connections Festival). She has also directed many pieces of new writing for theatres across Britain, including Scarborough (Edinburgh Fringe and the Royal Court) and Blame (Arcola Theatre). The Distance was shortlisted for the 2013 Susan Smith Blackburn Award.

MTC Associate Director Leticia Cáceres has been lauded as one of the most exciting talents in the country. For MTC she has directed Death and the Maiden, Birdland, The Effect, Cock, Constellations, Yellow Moon, Helicopter and Random (nominated for three Green Room Awards). She has also directed for Belvoir (Miss Julie and The Dark Room, nominated for seven Sydney Theatre Awards); La Mama (Tall Man); Creative Regions (Tales of the Underground); Queensland Theatre Company (The Orphanage Project, Far Away, and The Memory of Water); Sydney Opera House (Random, Hoods, and Children of the Black Skirt); La Boite Theatre/Brisbane Festival (Kingswood Kids); Arts Centre Melbourne and Brisbane Powerhouse (Hoods and Children of the Black Skirt). She is the co-founder of nationally acclaimed independent theatre company RealTV whose seminal work Hoods won the 2009 Matilda Award for Best Independent Production. In late 2015, STCSA and Belvoir will present the latest RealTV commission, Mortido starring Colin Friels.

One of Australia's most exciting and innovative young directors, Kip Williams brings the theatrical masterpiece *Miss Julie* to MTC for a modern revival, starring the inimitable Mark Leonard Winter (Birdland). This classic story of desire and class warfare opens on Thursday 21 April at Southbank Theatre, The Sumner.

Miss Julie marks the MTC debut of Kip Williams who, as Sydney Theatre Company's Resident Director, has received critical acclaim for his recent revivals of Macbeth and Suddenly Last Summer, for which he won the 2015 Helpmann Award for Best Director of a Play.

Director Kip Williams said, 'Miss Julie is one of the canon's great psychological thrillers. It drips with an intoxicating sexual tension and a dangerous power play. For generations, theatre makers have been drawn to it to reinvestigate questions of class, gender, and sexuality.'

Miss Julie is wild again tonight. Midsummer's Eve is her time, a night when rules are broken, when class barriers are set aside and the young mistress of the manor can dance with whomever she pleases. She chooses Jean, her father's valet, and for a few hours, through the long twilight, they play a dangerous game of What If? But the enchantment cannot last and soon the dawn will break.

Kip Williams has earned a reputation as one of the most inspiring young directors in the country. He has directed for theatre, opera and film, and is currently Resident Director at Sydney Theatre Company. While at STC he has directed Suddenly Last Summer, Macbeth, Children Of The Sun, Romeo And Juliet, Under Milkwood and was Associate Director with Andrew Upton on Cyrano De Bergerac. During this time he has directed some of Australia's leading actors including Hugo Weaving, Jacqueline McKenzie, Richard Roxburgh, Justine Clark, Robyn Nevin and Jack Thompson. For Malthouse Theatre's Helium and US-A-UM he directed an all-female production of Lord of the Flies; for Tamarama Rock Surfers he directed Fallout and for the Sydney Writers' Festival he directed 1001 Nights. His other credits include Fifth Of July (Princeton Theatre, New Jersey); One for the Road (for National Theatre, Melbourne), and Cloud 9, Lord of the Flies and Samuel Beckett's Not (NIDA). In 2015, Kip directed Caryl Churchill's new play Love And Information in a co-production for Malthouse Theatre and Sydney Theatre Company.

August Strindberg was a writer and artist of Swedish origin and considered a master of early modern drama for his daringly realistic plays. His career spanned four decades, during which time he wrote over 60 plays and more than 30 works of fiction, autobiography, history, cultural analysis, and politics. In his plays The Father (1887), Miss Julie (1888) and Creditors (1889), he created naturalistic dramas that often drew directly on his personal experience.

Poking fun at the luckiest social group in modern society, Straight White Men was one of the most talked-about plays of recent New York seasons and will now have its Australian premiere on Thursday 12 May at Arts Centre Melbourne, Fairfax Studio.

MTC Associate Director Leticia Cáceres takes on this study of social identity with a cast including Steve Mouzakis (Death and the Maiden, The Cherry Orchard) and Luke Ryan (Yellow Moon, Clybourne Park).

Director Leticia Cáceres said, 'In Straight White Men Young Jean Lee has created an intriguingly tongue-in-cheek study of social identity, privilege and the unsettling habit of holding whole social groups accountable for the acts of individuals. From work-to-work Young Jean Lee refuses to settle for a single theatrical form, pushing boundaries and earning her the reputation of one of America's most exciting contemporary theatre makers. This is perhaps her most conventional play to date but no less fearless in the themes it tackles.'

Christmas is for family, and brothers Matt, Jake and Drew gather at their Dad's house for the usual observances of the holiday season, adding a few rituals of their own, such as playing politically-correct board games and worrying about what Mum would think. Although she's been dead for some time now, their liberal, feminist mother still casts a vast shadow. She taught them how being heterosexual white males gives them an unfair advantage in America, but, as carefree youth gives way to mid-life anxiety, privileged is the last thing they feel.

Joanna Murray-Smith has achieved international success as an Australian playwright. Her work has been nominated for many awards including the Olivier Award for Best Comedy for The Female of the Species. Her other plays include Pennsylvania Avenue, Fury, True Minds, Day One. MTC Associate Director Leticia Cáceres said, 'It is a joy to be working with my long-time collaborator Angela Betzien and the wonderful Terrapin Puppet Theatre on this exciting new commission. *Egg* will capture the imagination of audiences young and old when it takes over the Lawler next July, and transport them into this futuristic tale with an important message at its core.'

Across a dry and dusty desert, two tinkers, Clyde and Horse, drag an enormous egg. They can't remember how long they've been dragging it, or why they've been dragging it, or where they are dragging it to. All they know is that it's really important. Life on their big bald egg of a planet depends upon it. So there's nothing to be done but to go on. Let's tug this great big googy into the future. And who knows? Maybe something wonderful will hatch.

Terrapin Puppet Theatre is Australia's premier contemporary puppet theatre, led by Artistic Director Sam Routledge. The company creates world-class performances for young people and their families, playing to ten thousand children in Tasmania each year, as well touring nationally and internationally.

Angela Betzien is a multi-award-winning writer and a founding member of independent theatre company RealTV whose work has toured widely across Australia and internationally. Her play The Dark Room won a 2010 AWGIE Award and the 2011 Sydney Theatre Award for Best New Australian Work. For Hoods, Angela was awarded the inaugural Richard Wherrett Prize for Excellence in Playwriting; and her play War Crimes won the 2012 Kit Denton Disfellowship and the QLD Literary Award for Playwriting, and was nominated for a NSW Premier's Literary Award in 2012. Angela's play Children of the Black Skirt toured Australian schools for three years and won the 2005 Drama Victoria Award for Best Performance by a Theatre Company for Secondary Schools.

MTC Associate Director Leticia Cáceres has been lauded as one of the most exciting talents in the country. For MTC she has directed Death and the Maiden, Birdland, The Effect, Cock, Constellations, Yellow Moon, Helicopter and Random (nominated for three Green Room Awards). She has also directed for Belvoir (Miss Julie and The Dark Room, nominated for seven Sydney Theatre Awards); Queensland Theatre Company (The Orphanage Project, Far Away, and The Memory of Water); Sydney Opera House (Random, Hoods, and Children of the Black Skirt); Arts Centre Melbourne and Brisbane Powerhouse (Hoods and Children of the Black Skirt). She is the co-founder of nationally acclaimed independent theatre company RealTV whose seminal work Hoods won the 2009 Matilda Award for Best Independent Production.

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# NEON X NEXT

In 2016, MTC continues its commitment to supporting and showcasing the exceptional work of Melbourne's independent artists through NEON NEXT - the evolution of MTC's Festival of Independent Theatre into an incubator for new independent works.

**NEON NEXT** sees MTC deepen the relationships it has established with the independent sector over the past three years and shift the focus towards commissioning, developing and presenting independent works for the stage.

'NEON has become synonymous with MTC's commitment to collaborating with and showcasing work from the independent theatre sector and the incredible artists behind it,' MTC Artistic Director Brett Sheehy said. 'NEON NEXT marks a new phase of this relationship, and recognises the importance of initiatives like NEON adapting and changing over time to ensure they remain relevant, fresh and meaningful to those they are directly trying to support.'

'As Victoria's flagship theatre company, we strive to provide opportunities for independent companies and artists to develop their skills to help further their careers and ensure their work has longevity and sustainability. We believe that this iteration of NEON is the next step in that journey and are excited about the new opportunities it will generate and the works that will result from it,' Mr Sheehy said.

For NEON NEXT 2016, Sisters Grimm stage their new production, Lilith: The Jungle Girl, commissioned and presented by MTC, and Daniel Schlusser and Nicola Gunn commence work on new MTC commissions.

'Sisters Grimm, Daniel Schlusser and Nicola Gunn represent some of the best independent artists in Melbourne. MTC audiences were treated to their work in the first two years of NEON, and it is a pleasure to be welcoming them back to the Company in 2016,' Mr Sheehy said. 'It is our wish that MTC annually facilitates the commissioning, development and presentation of new work by the independent and small-to-medium sector.'

NEON NEXT also sees MTC continue to provide a range of free professional development workshops and masterclasses for independent theatre practitioners throughout the year.

Since 2013 MTC's NEON has captivated the attention of Melbourne's theatre scene with 15 productions, as well as special events, panel discussions, readings, workshops, open rehearsals, masterclasses and a keynote address. So far, this important initiative has introduced the work of 17 companies and over 260 theatre makers to MTC and new audiences.

MTC delivers a comprehensive program that aims to broaden the experience of students, inspiring them to nurture a passion for theatre.

MTC Education offers a unique learning program, including the Youth Scholarship Course, MTC Ambassador Program, pre-show talks, tailored teaching resources and VCE Drama and Theatre Studies workshops.

In 2016, MTC's Education production is *Peddling*, a one-man show by Harry Melling that follows the story of a young man on the fringes of society. Directed by **Susie Dee**, *Peddling* will make its Australian Premiere at **Southbank Theatre**, **The Lawler in April 2016** before going on a tour to regional Victoria and Tasmania.

# Sharing the Light

MTC is passionate about making theatre accessible for all, and with our *Sharing the Light* initiative, disadvantaged students throughout Victoria and outer urban communities are enjoying greater opportunity to engage with theatre thanks to the generous support of the Crown Resorts Foundation.

Our subsidised \$5 Student Tickets and \$5 Family Show Tickets are already playing a role welcoming thousands of brand new audience members to the theatre, while the Regional Tour project is taking our Education production to young people all across Victoria and Tasmania.

In the first six months of the initiative, over 60 schools around Victoria have taken up the \$5 ticket offer, resulting in 2,500 tickets for students to attend MTC productions. Additionally, MTC has provided travel subsidies for more than 1,000 students from outer-metro and regional areas to get to the theatre.

Through Sharing the Light, MTC is also offering Indigenous Scholarships to help create career pathways for young Indigenous people. These scholarships take the form of an intensive work experience program tailored to each recipient's areas of interest within the field of theatre and live performance production.

MTC's Sharing the Light initiative is accompanied by a longitudinal study facilitated by the School of Culture and Communication at the University of Melbourne.

# MTC Community

MTC has a proud history as a leader and supporter of Australian artists and their work. We see our role in the community not just as a destination for great performance, but as a creative hub where artists are nurtured and developed, and new Australian writing is championed. MTC provides a range of artist access programs and initiatives each year including the Women in Theatre Program, the Assistant Directors Program, MTC CONNECT and Cybec Electric, as well as having a number of secondment and internships available and a host of Australian writers under commission.

## Women in Theatre Program

In 2016 MTC expands its successful Women Directors Program to Women in Theatre. Building on relationships already established and broadening the scope of mentoring opportunities available, the Women in Theatre Program will help create practical pathways for those interested in a range of areas across the business from production to artistic and executive management.

MTC's Women in Theatre program will include the opportunity for alumni of the Women Directors program and new applicants to be mentored by senior MTC staff; access leadership training, practical career advice and coaching across a wide range of business and commercial aspects of the theatre industry; and have the opportunity to gain insights to the daily operation

Applications for the MTC Women in Theatre Program will open in late 2015 with the program due to commence in early 2016.

## **Assistant Directors Program**

MTC's Assistant Directors Program provides the opportunity for emerging or mid-career artists to work on an MTC Mainstage production. These paid positions aim to enable directors to learn from senior theatre directors about the process of developing shows for large scale companies. During each project, participants will shadow the director in rehearsal, attend weekly production meetings, and observe the bump-in of a show to the theatre through to opening night.

Applications for the 2016 MTC Assistant Directors Program will open in late 2015.

# MTC Connect

MTC CONNECT is a partnership with Multicultural Arts Victoria that was established in 2014 to broaden the range of voices informing Melbourne Theatre Company's theatre making and programming processes.

A first for an Australian state theatre company, MTC CONNECT is a tailored program where theatre artists of diverse backgrounds act as cultural and artistic ambassadors, advocates and facilitators between MTC and their communities.

The program facilitates an open dialogue between MTC and the participants as they engage with the Company through individual masterclasses, one-on-one sessions, programming updates and debriefs from members of the MTC Artistic team, and longer-term initiatives.

## Cybec Electric

MTC's annual Cybec Electric play reading series celebrates theatre in its essence: great stories, electric writing and brilliant acting all working to ignite the audience's imagination. With scripts in hand, professional actors present new works-inprogress with the assistance of directors and dramaturgs. Cybec Electric is a rare opportunity for audiences to be part of the important development stage of new Australian plays.

# MTC **Foundation**

Established to assist the Company in attracting major philanthropic support, the MTC Foundation is chaired by Jane Hansen, director of The Little Group and MTC Board member.

The MTC Foundation was set up in 2014 to provide a mechanism to receive, consolidate and distribute all donations to MTC across four key areas of the business - Innovation, Community, Education and Southbank Theatre; and to build an endowment fund that will provide an ongoing secure revenue stream for the Company.

Along with Foundation Chair Jane Hansen, the other trustees to date are Terry Bracks, Fiona Griffiths, Janette Kendall, Tiffany Lucas, Virginia Lovett and Leigh O'Neill.

Many important MTC programs and initiatives such as education workshops, play readings, family shows and new commissions are primarily funded by donors. The Foundation ensures transparency for MTC donors and that all donations are used for the purposes agreed.

The endowment fund was initially seeded with \$500,000 to encourage further endowed donations and bequests. In 2014 the MTC Foundation received its first major leadership gift of \$2.5 million for its five-year Sharing The Light initiative supported by Crown Resorts Foundation.

MTC is a registered not-for-profit organisation. Approximately 70% of the Company's revenue comes from ticket sales; 20% from other income such as donations and corporate partnerships; and only 9.8% (net of government duties) from Government funding.

The four key areas of MTC's business receiving support through the Foundation are:

#### Innovation

Supporting local artists and writers to create ground-breaking works with stories that need to be heard.

#### Community

Making the magic of theatre accessible through family shows, ticket subsidies for underprivileged youth, and regional touring.

#### Education

Inspiring thousands of Victorian students each year with VCErelated productions, scholarships, workshops and school tours.

#### Southbank Theatre

Preserving and ensuring a sustainable Southbank Theatre as a dynamic, contemporary iconic landmark in the Melbourne cultural landscape.

# Brett Sheehy AO **Artistic Director**



Brett Sheehy Ao is one of Australia's most accomplished and acclaimed artistic directors. He is Artistic Director and CEO of Melbourne Theatre Company. He is the only person ever to be appointed to direct three of the five international arts festivals in Australia's state capital cities, having been Artistic Director of four Melbourne Festivals, two Adelaide Festivals and four Sydney Festivals.

He was also Artistic Director of the cultural program for the 5th Biennial World Summit on Arts and Culture in 2011. Brett has also been a mentor for the Australia Council's Emerging Leaders Development Program and a judge for the Sidney Myer Performing Arts Awards since 2012. From 2009-2012 he was selector and mentor for the Harold Mitchell Foundation Fellowships and a member of the Artists' Advisory Panel at Bell Shakespeare Company. He has been Founding Ambassador for Australia Council's We All Play a Part initiative encouraging nation-wide community involvement in the arts since 2008. He has also been a member of the Power Panel of the Australian Financial Review Magazine and a member of the Arts Advisory Group of the Australian Broadcasting Corporation. He was a member of the Committee for Sydney from 2001-2005.

In the 2012 Queen's Birthday Honours Brett was appointed an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO) for "distinguished service to the performing and visual arts as a director of national festivals, to international artistic exchange, and through mentoring roles."

# Virginia Lovett **Executive Director**



Virginia Lovett took up the role of MTC's Executive Director from January 2013. Prior to this she was General Manager of the Melbourne International Comedy Festival where she delivered a funding increase of \$5 million and in 2011 achieved record attendance levels. A highly experienced and well-respected arts manager, she successfully designed a range of strategic and audience

development initiatives through her roles at Melbourne International Comedy Festival and Sydney Festival.

In addition, Virginia has extensive marketing and communications experience gained in a range of different organisations including Zoos Victoria, Sydney's Powerhouse Museum, the Art Gallery of New South Wales and Sydney Theatre Company. She has also worked as a media advisor for state ministers in Victoria and New South Wales.

In 2006 she was awarded a Churchill Fellowship. She is currently Chair of Arena Theatre Company and a member of the Executive Council of Live Performance of Australia. She was formerly Deputy Chair of Force Majeure.













# Melbourne Theatre Company

Melbourne Theatre Company is one of Australia's flagship performing arts companies and has been enriching lives through the storytelling power of the finest theatre imaginable for 63 years. Under the leadership of Artistic Director Brett Sheehy Ao and Executive Director Virginia Lovett, MTC produces classic and contemporary Australian and international theatre with style, passion and excellence to entertain, challenge and engage audiences.

As one of the largest theatre companies in the English-speaking world, MTC employs over 500 artists and industry professionals each year (with approximately 90 full time staff), producing over 600 performances a season. It has a subscriber base of almost 20,000 people, and annually welcomes more than 200,000 people to its productions.

MTC produces a subscription season of up to twelve productions ranging from classics to new Australian works; plus an extensive Education Program; a Women in Theatre Program; a multicultural artists program; a family theatre program; regional, national and international tours; and regularly collaborates with companies and artists from the independent and small-to-medium sector through NEON and other initiatives.

In 2016 MTC is working with a host of outstanding talent including actors Kat Stewart, Shaun Micallef, Colin Friels, Kate Atkinson, Bert LaBonté, Mark Leonard Winter, Sarah Peirse, Christen O'Leary, Bobby Fox, and Ash Flanders; and award-winning directors including Kip Williams, Nadia Tass, Simon Phillips, Clare Watson, Peter Houghton, Sarah Goodes, MTC's Associate Artistic Director Sam Strong and Associate Director Leticia Cáceres.

These artists will be bringing to life works by some of the finest writers from Australia and abroad including Joanna Murray-Smith, Kate Mulvany, Tom Holloway, Carolyn Burns, Young Jean Lee, Duncan Macmillan, Deborah Bruce, Ayad Akhtar, David Hare, Neil Simon and August Strindberg.

MTC's home, Southbank Theatre, is located in the heart of Melbourne's Southbank Arts Precinct. Each year around half of the mainstage season is performed in the 560-seat Sumner, with smaller-scale works and other activities in the 150-seat Lawler. The balance of the mainstage season is staged at nearby Arts Centre Melbourne's 882-seat Playhouse and 376-seat Fairfax Studio, with the four theatres enabling MTC to present works of a wide variety and scale.

MTC is a semi-autonomous department of the University of Melbourne. Approximately 70% of MTC's revenue comes from ticket sales; 20% from sponsorship and donations; and, as a designated Australian Major Performing Arts Company, MTC receives approximately 9.8% (net of government duties) of its funding from the Australian Government through the Australia Council for the Arts and the Victorian Government through Creative Victoria.
