# MELBOURNE THEATRE COMPANY SEASON 2018

Melbourne Theatre Company Artistic Director Brett Sheehy AO today revealed MTC's 2018 Season and what promises to be another brilliant year at Victoria's state theatre company.

'Melbourne Theatre Company is where stories come alive and Season 2018 is bursting with plays as relevant, irresistible and complex as any we have presented in recent years,' **Brett Sheehy** said.

'The year begins and ends with two major events on Australia's cultural calendar and in between we have an enviable mix of world premieres, Australian premieres and fresh revivals of theatre classics – made even more irresistible by the host of exceptional actors, directors and creative teams assembled to bring them to life. In 2018, the 13 productions headed for our stages will inspire, entertain and challenge in equal measure and are guaranteed to leave audiences thinking about the world a little differently,' **Mr Sheehy** said.

To open the season, **MTC** and **Arts Centre Melbourne** present the Australian premiere of National Theatre's legendary production of *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time*, adapted by **Simon Stephens** from **Mark Haddon's** best-selling book, and directed by Tony Award winner **Marianne Elliott**.

**Pamela Rabe, Sarah Peirse** and **William Zappa** star in MTC and Sydney Theatre Company's Australian premiere co-production of **The Children** by **Lucy Kirkwood** – an incisive drama about the responsibility each generation faces in leaving a better world for those that follow – directed by MTC Associate Director **Sarah Goodes**.

Director **Stephen Nicolazzo** brings 70s British suburbia to Southbank Theatre with a lavish revival of **Mike Leigh's** cult-classic, *Abigail's Party*, starring **Eryn Jean Norvill** as Beverly and **Daniel Frederiksen** as her husband Laurence alongside **Katherine Tonkin** and **Benjamin Rigby**.

*Hungry Ghosts* by Jean Tong receives its world premiere for MTC Education exploring issues of cultural and sexual identity, politics, corruption and the often-confusing world we must navigate every day starring Emina Ashman and Jing-Xuan Chan, directed by Petra Kalive.

Olivier Award-winning playwright **Mike Bartlett's** darkly comic twist on the Edward Snowden story, **Wild**, makes its Australian premiere starring **Anna Lise Phillips**, directed by MTC Associate Director **Dean Bryant**.

*The House of Bernarda Alba* sees celebrated playwright **Patricia Cornelius** take Spanish dramatist Federico García Lorca's classic tragedy out of the villages of Spain and into the heat of rural Western Australia in a raw and exhilarating adaptation directed by **Leticia Cáceres**, starring **Peta Brady**, **Julie Forsyth**, **Bessie Holland** and **Melita Jurisic**.

**Branden Jacobs-Jenkins's** blistering satire and Pulitzer Prize finalist *Gloria* makes its Australian premiere under the direction of Lee Lewis, starring stage and screen favourite Lisa McCune in the title role alongside Callan Colley, Aileen Huynh and Sophie Ross.

Gina Riley and William McInnes lead an all-star cast including Simon Gleeson, Brent Hill, Michelle Lim Davidson, Zindzi Okenyo and Christie Whelan Browne in Oscar Wilde's effervescent society drama, *An Ideal Husband*, directed by Dean Bryant.

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The audaciously titled **A Doll's House, Part 2** by Lucas Hnath makes its Australian premiere, continuing Ibsen's story – 15 years later – with an intriguing and decidedly modern perspective starring **Marta Dusseldorp** as Nora opposite **Greg Stone** as her husband Torvald, directed by **Sarah Goodes**.

The world premiere NEON NEXT commission *Working with Children* takes on the sometimes hypocritical lives of teachers, artists and regulators in an emotionally evocative and technologically inventive production written, directed and performed by **Nicola Gunn**.

Linda Cropper stars as the feisty but fiercely determined Helen in the world premiere of Aidan Fennessy's surprising, suspenseful and deeply poignant story of two unlikely companions, *The Architect*, directed by Peter Houghton.

Elaine Crombie, Kamil Ellis, Tony Nikolakopoulos and Calen Tassone star in the world premiere of *Astroman* by Albert Belz, an uplifting and humorous coming of age story set in 1980s Geelong, directed by Sarah Goodes with Tony Briggs as Associate Director.

And to close MTC's 2018 Season, stage and screen luminary **Geoffrey Rush** reunites with director **Simon Phillips** to star as Malvolio in Shakespeare's exquisite comedy, *Twelfth Night*, alongside a cast of comic talents including **Brent Hill, Richard Piper, Christie Whelan Browne** and **Frank Woodley**.

'Season 2018 is abundant in the urgency and relevance, or indeed renewed relevance, of its stories, and it is with great pleasure that we embark on the year ahead together with our artists and audiences. Every year I am heartened by the enthusiasm, passion and generosity of those who embrace the art on our stages in such great numbers,' **Brett Sheehy** said.

In addition to the productions, 2018 sees MTC continue its award-winning **Education Program**, providing unique learning opportunities, enrichment activities and resources for students and teachers designed to ensure young audiences experience exceptional theatre and educational programs.

Similarly, MTC's **Sharing the Light** initiative enters its fourth year, making theatre more accessible through subsidised \$5 tickets for eligible students and families, scholarships for young Indigenous people and an extensive regional tour of MTC's Education production.

In 2018 MTC's newly announced \$4.6 million **NEXT STAGE Writers' Program** will be well into its first year with seven commissioned writers and three new writers-in-residence.

And MTC's industry-leading initiatives continue, furthering the Company's commitment to artist development through the annual **Cybec Electric** play reading series, celebrating new writing for the stage; the **Assistant Directors** and secondment programs, nurturing the careers of young directors, stage managers and creatives; **NEON NEXT**, supporting the independent theatre sector; and the **Women in Theatre Program**, developing the careers of future leaders in all areas of the sector.

'As we look to 2018 and everything on offer – our productions, programs and initiatives – we are proud to be a company that provides the people of Melbourne, Victoria and Australia with such remarkable experiences and opportunities. I look forward to sharing the year with the many thousands who make up our MTC community,' **Brett Sheehy** said.

Single tickets for *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time* go on sale on Monday 13 November, and single tickets for *The Children* and *Abigail's Party* go on sale on Friday 1 December.

# INCIDEN OF THE IMNIGHT-1

Melbourne Theatre Company and Arts Centre Melbourne present the National Theatre's Olivier and Tony Award-winning production of The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time, adapted by Simon Stephens (Birdland) from Mark Haddon's best-selling book, and directed by Tony Award winner Marianne Elliott (War Horse).

This record-breaking production will make its Australian debut at Arts Centre Melbourne, Playhouse on Saturday 13 January.

Director Marianne Elliott said 'I'm absolutely thrilled that our production of The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time will make its Australian premiere in Melbourne. I was overwhelmed by the way audiences in Melbourne took the NT's productions of War Horse to their hearts, and I look forward to sharing with them our staging of Mark Haddon's beautiful story of love, family and bravery in the most unlikely of environments.'

Curious Incident is the recipient of a record-breaking seven 2013 Olivier Awards, including Best New Play, Best Director, Best Design, Best Lighting Design and Best Sound Design more Oliviers than any other play in the history of London's West End at that time.

It also won five Tony Awards including Best Play, six Drama Desk Awards including Outstanding Play; five Outer Critics Circle Awards including Outstanding New Broadway Play; and the Drama League Award for Outstanding Production of a Broadway or Off Broadway Play.

The show tells the story of Christopher John Francis Boone, who is fifteen years old. He stands beside Mrs Shears' dead dog, which has been speared with a garden fork, it is seven minutes after midnight and Christopher is under suspicion. He records each fact in a book he is writing to solve the mystery of who killed Wellington. He has an extraordinary brain, and is exceptional at maths while ill-equipped to interpret everyday life. He has never ventured alone beyond the end of his road, he detests being touched and distrusts strangers. But his detective work, forbidden by his father, takes him on a frightening journey that upturns his world.

MTC Artistic Director Brett Sheehy AO said, 'Since I first saw this show in March 2013 on the West End I've been desperate for us to bring it to Melbourne. Six years later, and in collaboration with our great friends and colleagues at Arts Centre Melbourne, I'm delighted that the National Theatre production of Curious Incident will open our 2018 Season. It is storytelling at its finest and a remarkable work of theatre that resonates with young and old.'

To complement the Australian premiere season of Curious Incident, Arts Centre Melbourne will host an Associated Program for students and the public consisting of workshops and talks with creatives, insights into the production, immersive experiences and a Relaxed Performance.

Relaxed Performances are for everyone who will benefit from a more relaxed environment but are specifically designed to welcome patrons with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) or other disabilities that create sensory sensitivity. Sound and lighting cues are adjusted, doors

A pre-show visual story is also available for patrons to prepare for their visit and the performance. The range of events included in the *Curious Incident* Associated Program are designed to enrich audiences' experience of and engagement with this ground-breaking production.

Arts Centre Melbourne CEO Claire Spencer said, 'Arts Centre Melbourne is a place for everyone, and this beautiful, wondrous piece of theatre is the perfect vehicle to bring people of all ages and abilities together to share in a truly remarkable cultural experience. We're delighted to be collaborating with one of our flagship resident companies, MTC, to bring this show to Melbourne.'

Mark Haddon's novel, *Curious Incident*, was published in 2003 and was the winner of more than 17 literary awards, including prizes in the US, Japan, the Netherlands and Italy, as well as the prestigious Whitbread Book of the Year Award in the UK in 2004. The novel has been translated into 44 languages and sold more than 5.5 million copies worldwide.

The stage production of *Curious Incident* transferred to London's West End in September 2012, following a sold-out run at the National Theatre's Cottesloe Theatre. Two years later it premiered at the Barrymore Theatre in New York City and was the longest-running play on Broadway in over a decade.

*Curious Incident* is currently on a major tour of the US until September 2017, and a second tour of the UK and Ireland continues until September 2017.

Marianne Elliott was an Associate Director of the National Theatre for 10 years, and her latest play for the company was a new production of Tony Kushner's *Angels in America* which opened in April 2017. Her other work includes *War Horse* (co-directed with Tom Morris), *The Light Princess, Port, Season's Greetings, All's Well That Ends Well, Harper Regan, Saint Joan* (Olivier Award for Best Revival, South Bank Show Award for Theatre), and Pillars of the Community (Evening Standard Award for Best Director). Marianne was consultant director on *The Elephantom* for the National Theatre and directed *Sweet Bird of Youth* for the Old Vic with Kim Cattrall. Marianne recently formed a new company with producer Chris Harper – Elliott Harper Productions.

Mark Haddon is an author, illustrator and screenwriter who has written fifteen books for children and won two BAFTAS. His bestselling novel, *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time*, was published simultaneously by Jonathan Cape and David Fickling in 2003. It won seventeen literary prizes, including the Whitbread Award. His poetry collection, *The Talking Horse and the Sad Girl and the Village Under the Sea*, was published by Picador in 2005, and his last novel, *The Red House*, was published by Jonathan Cape in 2012. His latest book is *The Pier Falls*, a collection of stories.

**Simon Stephens**' plays for the National Theatre include a new translation of *The Threepenny Opera, Port* (originally produced at the Royal Exchange and directed by Marianne Elliott) at the National Theatre's Lyttelton Theatre, *Harper Regan* (which was produced at Canadian Stage) and *On the Shore of the Wide World* (co-production with Royal Exchange, Manchester; Olivier Award for Best New Play). His many other plays include *Carmen Disruption, Heisenberg, Birdland* (which had its Australian premiere at MTC in 2015), *Blindsided, Three Kingdoms, Wastwater, Punk Rock, Seawall, Pornography, Country Music, Christmas* and *Herons, A Thousand Stars Explode in the Sky* (co-written with Robert Holman and David Eldridge), and an adaptation of Jon Fosse's *I Am the Wind* and *Motortown*. His version of *A Doll's House* for the Young Vic transferred to the West End and then New York in 2014. Simon is an Associate at the Lyric, Hammersmith and the Royal Court Theatre. Three of Australia's finest actors, **Pamela Rabe** (*Wentworth*), **Sarah Peirse** (*Switzerland*) and **William Zappa** (*Rock 'n' Roll*), star in Melbourne Theatre Company and Sydney Theatre Company's Australian premiere co-production of **The Children** – an incisive drama about the responsibility each generation faces in leaving a better world for those that follow.

Opening on **Thursday 8 February** at Southbank Theatre, The Sumner and directed by MTC Associate Director **Sarah Goodes**, *The Children* is a new play by one of contemporary theatre's most compelling voices, **Lucy Kirkwood**.

**Sarah Goodes** said, 'Lucy Kirkwood is one of the most exciting playwrights working today. Her play presents a fragile normality that rumbles with big ideas and questions about generational responsibility and how we choose to live our lives. Pamela and Sarah last performed together on the MTC stage 27 years ago. Don't miss the chance to see these two formidable legends in this razor sharp drama.'

In an isolated cottage on the English coast, two retired nuclear physicists are living a quiet existence. Life is tough, electricity is rationed, and they keep a Geiger counter on hand for good reason. But they have worked all their lives for their retirement and now they are determined to enjoy it. Until one day, an old friend and colleague arrives unexpectedly, bringing memories of the past and a frightening challenge for the future.

**Lucy Kirkwood** is a British playwright whose first play *It Felt Empty When the Heart Went at First But it is Alright Now* earned her a nomination for Best Newcomer at the Evening Standard Awards. Her critically acclaimed play *Chimerica* premiered at Almeida Theatre in 2013 and subsequently transferred to the West End, winning Best New Play at the 2014 Olivier and Evening Standard Awards, as well as the Critics Circle Award and the Susan Smith Blackburn Award. In 2017 *Chimerica* had its Australian premiere at Sydney Theatre Company to critical acclaim. *The Children* premiered in November 2016 at the Royal Court, London, while her most recent play *Mosquitoes*, opens at the National Theatre in September 2017.

MTC Associate Director **Sarah Goodes'** reputation as a leading director of new Australian and international work has been built on widespread praise and multiple award nominations. For MTC her recent work includes *Three Little Words, John* and *Switzerland* (following its acclaimed season in Sydney). Formerly Resident Director at Sydney Theatre Company, Sarah directed *The Hanging, Disgraced, Orlando, Battle of Waterloo, The Effect, Vere (Faith), The Splinter* and *Edward Gant's Amazing Feats of Loneliness.* Her other directing credits include *Elling, Black Milk, The Sweetest Thing,* and *The Small Things* (B Sharp Belvoir); *The Colour of Panic* (Sydney Opera House); *Vertigo and the Virginia, The Schelling Point, Hilt,* and *What Happened Was* (Old Fitzroy Theatre); and *The Unscrupulous Murderer Hasse Karlson Reveals the Gruesome Truth about the Woman Who Froze to Death on a Railway Bridge* (Darlinghurst Theatre Company). In 2015 she was the recipient of the Gloria Payten Travel Scholarship.

# ABIGAIL'S PARTY

Director **Stephen Nicolazzo** (*Dangerous Liaisons, Merciless Gods*) brings 70s British suburbia to Southbank Theatre with a lavish revival of **Mike Leigh's** cult-classic, *Abigail's Party*.

Starring **Eryn Jean Norvill** (*All My Sons*) as Beverly and **Daniel Frederiksen** (*Matilda*) as her husband Laurence alongside **Katherine Tonkin** (*Three Little Words*) and **Benjamin Rigby** (*Alien: The Covenant*), this iconic and riotously funny satire opens on **Thursday 22 March**.

**Stephen Nicolazzo** said, '*Abigail's Party* is a kitsch, grotesque and heart-breaking satire that dissects class and sexuality with a razor sharp blade; it is both a domestic nightmare and a divine farce. Mike Leigh's ability to bring humanity and humour to the darkest of situations and create characters that are bold, flawed, and hysterically funny is key to the success of a play like *Abigail's Party*. It is an audacious classic and I am thrilled to bring it to Melbourne Theatre Company for the very first time. If you love Donna Summer, bad hors d'ouvres, palazzo pants and drunken arguments, *Abigail's Party* will satiate with its transgressive portrayal of the pre-Thatcher era.'

Forty years on from its original staging, *Abigail's Party* remains a wonderfully sharp portrait of middle class aspirations, tension and pretensions. And in this age of bold aspiration and excessive consumption, it gains new relevance. Over cheese and pineapple sticks, Demis Roussos records and copious amounts of alcohol, we witness one disastrous evening of social awkwardness, outrageous flirting, cringeworthy one-upmanship and hilarious put-downs at the suburban party from hell.

**Mike Leigh** is one of the world's most influential dramatists and filmmakers. He has written and directed over 20 stage plays including *Babies Grow Old*, *Abigail's Party*, *Ecstasy*, *Goose-Pimples*, *Smelling A Rat*, *Greek Tragedy*, It's A *Great Big Shame!*, *Two Thousand Years* and *Grief*. Most recently he directed the highly praised biographical film of British artist J.M. *Turner*, *Mr. Turner*. His first feature film was *Bleak Moments*, followed by full-length television films Hard Labour, Nuts In May, The Kiss of Death, Who's Who, Grown-Ups, Home Sweet *Home, Meantime* and *Four Days In July*. His other feature films are *High Hopes*, *Life Is Sweet*, *Naked*, *Secrets & Lies*, *Career Girls*, *Topsy-Turvy*, *All Or Nothing*, *Vera Drake*, *Happy-Go-Lucky* and *Another Year*.

**Stephen Nicolazzo** is a Melbourne based theatre director and the Artistic Director of Little Ones Theatre. His directing credits include *Merciless Gods* (Little Ones/Darebin Arts/Griffin Theatre Company), *The Moors* (Red Stitch), *Playing to Win* (Arts Centre Melbourne), *The Happy Prince* (Little Ones/La Mama), *Dracula* (Little Ones/Theatre Works), *Meme Girls* (Malthouse Theatre), *Dangerous Liaisons* (Little Ones/MTC NEON, Darwin Festival/Brisbane Powerhouse/Theatre Works), *The House of Yes* (Little Ones/Malthouse Theatre Helium), *Psycho Beach Party* (Little Ones/Theatre Works/Midsumma Festival/Brisbane Festival), and *sex.violence.blood.gore* (MKA). # HUNGRY GHOST

Following its development as part of MTC's Cybec Electric play reading series in 2017, *Hungry Ghosts* will have its world premiere on **Saturday 5 May** at Southbank Theatre, The Lawler.

This bold new work will be directed by **Petra Kalive** (*Melbourne Talam*), starring **Emina Ashman** (*Roberto Zucco*) and **Jing-Xuan Chan** (*The Family Law*).

When you're a young, queer Chinese-Malaysian Australian, how do you work out where you belong in the world? Criss-crossing between storylines of the fate of MH370, corruption in Malaysia and the exploration of identity, *Hungry Ghosts* offers an unconventional take on contemporary life.

*Hungry Ghosts* is MTC's 2018 Education production, forming part of the Company's awardwinning Education Program that reaches thousands of students across Victoria every year. ### WILD by Mike Bartlett

Olivier Award-winning playwright **Mike Bartlett's** darkly comic twist on the Edward Snowden story, **Wild**, makes its Australian premiere on **Thursday 10 May** at Southbank Theatre, The Sumner, starring **Anna Lise Phillips** (*Devil's Playground, Crownies, Animal Kingdom*) and directed by MTC Associate Director **Dean Bryant**.

In 2014 MTC presented the Australian premiere of Mike Bartlett's intimate and provocative play *Cock*, exploring modern questions of relationships and love. In *Wild*, Bartlett once again turns his attention to contemporary issues, this time in a riveting thriller where nothing is as it seems.

## THE HOUSE OF BERNARDA ALBA

by Patricia Cornelius, after Federico García Lorca

The House of Bernarda Alba sees celebrated playwright Patricia Cornelius take Spanish dramatist Federico García Lorca's classic tragedy out of the villages of Spain and into the heat of rural Western Australia in a raw and exhilarating adaptation directed by the much lauded Leticia Cáceres (The Drover's Wife).

Starring Peta Brady (SHIT), Julie Forsyth (Endgame), Bessie Holland (Blaque Showgirls) and Melita Jurisic (John), this MTC commission opens on Thursday 31 May at Arts Centre Melbourne, Fairfax Studio.

Leticia Cáceres said, 'The House of Bernarda Alba is a project that Patricia and I have been cultivating for a long time. It is the perfect vehicle to explore the politics of gender and the female body. We've dreamed up a non-conventional Alba, one that sizzles under the harsh Australian sun.'

With their mining-mogul father dead, the Alba household is in mourning. All four daughters have been called home to pay their respects by their mother, who is truly a force of nature. The future seems wildly uncertain for all but the eldest sister, who has inherited a fortune and is engaged to the local heartthrob. But as tensions rise and tempers flare, will any of them have the power to alter their own destinies?

Patricia Cornelius is one of Australia's most prolific playwrights. She has written over 25 plays including SHIT which premiered in 2015 as part of MTC NEON and has since had multiple return seasons; Savages; and Who's Afraid of the Working Class?, co-written with Andrew Bovell, Christos Tsiolkas, Melissa Reeves and Irine Vela. Her prizes for stage work include Victorian and NSW Premiers' Literary Awards, the Patrick White Playwright's Award, Green Room Awards, the Richard Wherrett Prize, the Wal Cherry Award and nine AWGIES. She won the prestigious Australian Writers Foundation Playwriting Award in 2015 as well as the Patrick White Fellowship in 2012, and a Fellowship from the Australia Council's Theatre Board. Patricia has won the AWGIE Major Award three times and in 2017 was announced as one of MTC's inaugural NEXT STAGE commissioned writers.

Leticia Cáceres is one of Australia's leading theatre directors. Associate Director at MTC from 2013 to 2015, Leticia directed The Distance, Death and the Maiden, Birdland, The Effect, Cock, and Constellations for the Company, as well as MTC Education shows Yellow Moon, Helicopter and Random. She received Helpmann and Sydney Theatre Awards for Best Direction of a Play for The Drover's Wife (Belvoir), which also won Best Production at both ceremonies in 2017. For Belvoir, she also directed Mortido (co-produced with State Theatre Company of South Australia), Miss Julie and The Dark Room, nominated for seven Sydney Theatre Awards. Leticia is the co-founder of nationally acclaimed RealTV with multi-award winning playwright, Angela Betzien. For RealTV she has directed Tall Man, War Crimes, Hoods and Children of the Black Skirt. RealTV are recipients of Brilliant Careers funding through Screen Australia to adapt their stage content for screen, in consultation with Matchbox Pictures and Madman Productions. In 2017 Leticia will direct two short films: Wild (completed) and Father's Day. Leticia is the 2017 recipient of a Keith and Elizabeth Murdoch Travel Scholarship.

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### GLORIA by Branden Jacobs-Jenkins

**Branden Jacobs-Jenkins's** Pulitzer Prize finalist *Gloria* is a blistering satire of office politics and our exploitative, media-saturated age that has shocked and surprised audiences around the US.

Making its Australian premiere under the direction of Lee Lewis (*The Bleeding Tree*), *Gloria* opens on **Thursday 21 June** at Southbank Theatre, The Sumner, starring stage and screen favourite Lisa McCune (*Dead Man's Cellphone*) in the title role alongside newcomer Callan Colley, Aileen Huynh (*Cleverman*) and Sophie Ross (*What Rhymes with Cars and Girls*).

Lee Lewis said, 'Branden Jacobs-Jenkins is one of the smartest playwrights in America today. His understanding of the deep awfulness in American society is heartbreaking because it is tempered with a genuine hopefulness for humanity. His writing is brave, funny, and literate; his big philosophies are embedded so deeply that you don't hear a playwright's voice, you hear his characters as alive flawed people. You can sense that he believes in the power of theatre to change the world for the better, and his skill is such that he makes us believe too.'

**Branden Jacobs-Jenkins**' *Gloria* was a finalist for the 2016 Pulitzer Prize for Drama, adding to his long list of honours including the MacArthur Fellowship, Benjamin Danks Award from the American Academy of Arts, and the Steinberg Playwriting Award. His other plays include *Appropriate* and *An Octoroon* (both Obie Award-winners for Best New American Play). He is a graduate of Princeton University, New York University and The Julliard School. He worked in the fiction department at *The New Yorker* magazine for almost three years.

Lee Lewis is the Artistic Director of Griffin Theatre Company and returns to MTC after directing Hay Fever in 2017 and the world premiere of Rupert in 2014. 

In 1879 Nora Helmer handed her husband her keys and wedding ring and left home, slamming the door behind her. Lucas Hnath's plays include The Christians, Red Speedo, A Public Reading of an Unproduced Screenplay about the Death of Walt Disney, Nightnight, Isaac's Eye, Death Tax and The Courtship of Anna Nicole Smith. His plays are published by Dramatists Play Service. Lucas has been a resident playwright at New Dramatists since 2011, and is a proud member of the Ensemble Studio Theatre. Lucas is a winner of the 2012 Whitfield Cook Award for Isaac's Eye and received a 2013 Steinberg/ATCA New Play Award Citation for Death Tax. He has also received commissions from the EST/Sloan Project, Actors Theatre of Louisville, South Coast Repertory, Playwrights Horizons, New York University's Graduate Acting Program, and the Royal Court Theatre. Lucas holds a BFA and an MFA from New York University's Department of Dramatic Writing.

MTC Associate Director **Sarah Goodes'** reputation as a leading director of new Australian and international work has been built on widespread praise and multiple award nominations. For MTC her recent work includes *Three Little Words, John* and *Switzerland* (following its acclaimed season in Sydney). 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### STUDIO SEASON WORKING WITH CHILDREN by Nicola Gunn

Written, directed and performed by **Nicola Gunn** (*Piece for Person and Ghetto Blaster, Green Screen*), **Working With Children** takes on the sometimes hypocritical lives of teachers, artists and regulators in an emotionally evocative and technologically inventive production.

Opening on **Saturday 1 September** at Southbank Theatre, The Lawler, this NEON NEXT Commission sees **Nicola Gunn** use her seductively subversive humour to turn our attention to the moral and ethical complexity of working with children and other social taboos.

**Nicola Gunn** said, 'I've recently noticed a lot of contemporary theatre makers are working with children to make performances for an adult audience. I wondered why this was and how does it change or amplify the meaning of something and what are our responsibilities in doing so. Or perhaps it's just that we've all run out of ideas and children are simply funnier and smarter than us. I should add that unfortunately there are no children in this show.'

Just imagine a woman who works with children. Now imagine a man who works with children. Imagine the woman who works with children has a secret that she's ashamed of. Imagine the man is going through a messy divorce. Now imagine there are regulations in place to protect the children they're working with from inappropriate things like dark emotions or the vulnerability of reality.

Ahead of its world premiere, *Working with Children* will receive artistic support from world-renowned Belgian arts centre CAMPO and artistic associate Pol Heyvaert.

Nicola Gunn is an award-winning writer, director, performer and designer, who combines text, choreography and visual art to create contemporary performance productions. She finds parallels between personal experiences and larger social realities, often using subversive humour to explore the fragility of the human condition. Her extensive body of work includes *Piece for Person and Ghetto Blaster* (Green Room Award for Outstanding Contemporary & Experimental Performance), *Mermermer* (Helpmann Award nomination for Best Visual or Physical Theatre Production); *The Interpreters*, performed at Alliance Française in French, English, Auslan and Boon Wurrung; and *Green Screen*, for MTC NEON 2014. She was artist in residence with Kaldor Public Art Projects under the mentorship of Marina Abramovic in 2015. # THE ARCHITECT

**Sarah Goodes** said, '*Astroman* was the hit of the Australian Playwriting Festival in 2015 and I'm thrilled to be a part of its highly anticipated world premiere. It is a coming of age story that offers a nostalgic, hilarious and heartbreaking look at the 80s in Geelong. It is also a beautiful piece of writing that offers wonderful roles for young indigenous actors and I am delighted to be working with Kamil Ellis and Calen Tassone together with Tony Briggs as Associate Director.'

For a troubled but brilliant teenager in 1980s Geelong, the world is a small place. Thirteenyear-old Jiembra Djalu and his brother Sonny are the new kids in town, and while Jiembra may be a video game whizz and maths genius, he's always getting into strife. A friendship with the owner of the local arcade and a chance at gaming glory could see him change his life forever, but could also mean leaving behind what means most – his brother and adoring mother.

Albert Belz is a director, screenwriter, award-winning playwright and lecturer from New Zealand, and has written for television, theatre, print and radio for over a decade. His unique voice has crossed datelines and divides, having had his work performed in London, New York, Lille, Sydney, Brisbane, Adelaide and even Otaki. His other plays include *Yours Truly* and *Raising the Titanics*. Albert also won the prestigious Bruce Mason Playwriting Award in 2006. Having returned to New Zealand from Melbourne in 2015, he currently resides in Auckland where he lectures in Writing for Screen and Stage at the Faculty of Creative Arts, Manukau Institute of Technology. 'I can't believe I've never had the opportunity to work on it before. This is a wonderful chance for me to reunite with some of my long-time comic associates, and get to know some others I have long admired, so I can't wait.'

Twins Viola and Sebastian are separated after a shipwreck and forced to fend for themselves in a strange land. Viola (disguised as a boy) falls in love with Duke Orsino, who is in love with the Countess Olivia, who meets Viola and falls in love with her, thinking she is a man. It's all very straightforward.

Internationally renowned director Simon Phillips was MTC's Artistic Director from 2000-2011. Over his 30 year history with the Company he has directed an impressive number of productions, with his recent MTC credits including Macbeth, North by Northwest, Pennsylvania Avenue, The Importance of Being Earnest, Hamlet, Songs for Nobodies, Richard III, The Drowsy Chaperone and August: Osage Country. In 2015 Simon directed the awardwinning Australian musical Ladies in Black for Queensland Theatre which went on to have a highly successful season with MTC in 2016, followed by a commercial tour in 2017. Over his illustrious career Simon has also worked for many other arts organisations nationally and internationally including the State Theatre Company of South Australia, where he was Artistic Director from 1990–1993. On the commercial stage, his productions include The 2016 Australian tour of The Beast as well as Priscilla Queen of the Desert, the Musical; Andrew Lloyd Webber's Love Never Dies, and Eat Pray Laugh - Barry Humphries's farewell tour, all of which have had various international seasons. Simon has won seven Green Room Awards and five Helpmann Awards.

# NEXT STAGE WRITERS' PROGRAM

Launched in June 2017, Melbourne Theatre Company's NEXT STAGE Writers' Program is a \$4.6 million investment in Australian writers co-funded by the visionary donors of MTC's Playwrights Giving Circle and Melbourne Theatre Company.

It is the most rigorous playwright commissioning and development process ever undertaken by the Company, setting a new benchmark for play development in Australia that will enhance the fabric, and legacy, of Australian live storytelling.

Across the five years of the program, NEXT STAGE will provide a total of 50 opportunities for Australian writers, consisting of residencies and commissions.

It will also see an increase in resources dedicated to workshopping and developing plays from drafts through to production to ensure that they have been afforded every level of creative scrutiny and artistic support in making the finest possible work.

The program will ensure a minimum of 35 new play commissions, with flexibility in commissioning fees to allow writers additional time and resources to write; and up to 15 writer-in-residence opportunities for playwrights to embed themselves in the Company for up to three years. Residencies are offered by application and the writers receive a generous annual stipend, office resources, company support, regular meetings with the Artistic team and integration with all aspects of MTC's operations including programming.

In the first year of the program, there are seven commissioned writers and three writers-in-residence.

The first cohort of commissioned writers is Angus Cerini, Patricia Cornelius, Michael Gow, Benjamin Law, Joanna Murray-Smith, Leah Purcell and Ellen van Neerven.

In August 2017 the inaugural writers-in-residence were appointed with Don Giovanonni, Natesha Somasundaram and Kylie Trounson joining the program.

To support the program, a national group of advisors has been established with whom MTC will consult about writers of promise from a range of creative disciplines. The group represents experts from a broad cross section of performance and literary fields and includes Tony Ayres, David Berthold, Lee Lewis, Rachael Maza, Kate Mulvany, Simon Phillips and Morry Schwartz.

This new play criss-crosses between storylines of the fate of MH370, corruption in Malaysia and the exploration of identity. *Hungry Ghosts* will make its world premiere at Southbank Theatre, The Lawler in May 2018 before touring regionally.

MTC's subsidised \$5 Student Tickets and \$5 Family Tickets have been welcoming thousands of brand new audience members to the theatre, while the annual Regional Tour is taking our Education production to young people in regional Victoria and Tasmania.

Since Sharing the Light began in 2015, almost 160 schools around Victoria have taken up the \$5 ticket offer, resulting in over 10,000 tickets for students to attend MTC productions. Additionally, MTC has provided travel subsidies for over 2,500 students from outer-metro and regional areas to get to the theatre.

In 2017 the Regional Tour allowed MTC's Education production to tour as a full-scale production to numerous regional venues for the second time, and this will continue in 2018.

Through Sharing the Light, MTC also offers an Indigenous Scholarship Program to help create career pathways for young Indigenous people. This program takes the form of four week-long intensive workshops designed to expose the participants to the many career paths within the field of theatre and live performance production.

MTC employs over 500 artists and industry professionals annually and is a significant contributor to artist and sector development. The range of opportunities for theatre practitioners to develop their skills and careers includes MTC's industry-leading Women in Theatre Program, Cybec Electric play reading series and Assistant Directors and secondment programs. MTC also collaborates with companies and artists from the independent and small-to-medium sector through NEON NEXT and other initiatives.

In 2017 MTC announced its NEXT STAGE Writers' Program, a \$4.6 million investment in Australian writers co-funded by the donors of MTC's Playwrights Giving Circle and MTC. The landmark initiative will provide a total of 50 opportunities for Australian writers, consisting of residencies and commissions across the five years of the program, and marks a pivotal shift in the playwright development and commissioning landscape.

MTC's home venue, Southbank Theatre, is located in the heart of Melbourne's Southbank Arts Precinct. Each year around half of the mainstage season is performed in the Sumner (560-seats), with smaller-scale works and other activities in the Lawler (162-seats). The balance of the mainstage season is staged at nearby Arts Centre Melbourne's Playhouse (882-seats) and Fairfax Studio (376-seat), with the four theatres enabling MTC to present works of a wide variety and scale.

MTC is a semi-autonomous department of the University of Melbourne. 56% of MTC's revenue comes from the Box Office; 10% from corporate partnerships; 9% from private donations; and 8% (net of government duties) from the Australian Government through the Australia Council for the Arts and the Victorian Government through Creative Victoria.

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# **MTC Foundation**

As the state theatre company of Victoria, MTC has a great responsibility to its audiences and artists to ensure that the Company remains the vibrant cultural beacon that it is today.

MTC has big plans for the future including developing new landmark Australian works for the stage, touring internationally, making theatre as accessible as possible and bringing the best theatre from around the world to Melbourne audiences. The MTC Foundation is committed to making these dreams a reality so that generations of Australians may reap the benefits.

Established to assist Melbourne Theatre Company in attracting major and sustained philanthropic support, the MTC Foundation is charged with appropriately managing and distributing donations across key areas of MTC's business to realise the Company's strategic and artistic goals.

Donations to MTC provide essential and ongoing contributions to the Company's core mainstage operations as well as targeting specific programs.

Many of MTC's initiatives such as the NEXT STAGE Writers' Program, play readings, new writing commissions, subsidised tickets for schools, the Women in Theatre Program, and Education and family initiatives are only possible due to targeted donations to the MTC Foundation. As a state theatre company, these activities are what sets MTC apart from the commercial theatre sector and are central to the fundraising efforts of the Foundation. All donations to the Company go through the MTC Foundation, which is chaired by philanthropist and businesswoman, Jane Hansen, and governed by Board Members Terry Bracks AM, Fiona Griffiths, Janette Kendall, Dr Sam Margis, Louise Myer, Leigh O'Neill, Hilary Scott and Richard Tegoni along with support from MTC Executive Director Virginia Lovett, Finance Director Liz Chappell and Development Director Jayne Lovelock.

The MTC Foundation is also responsible for building and managing MTC's general endowment fund to help secure a strong, sustainable and artistically vibrant future for the Company. In February 2016, the general endowment fund was seeded with a leadership gift from The Little Foundation of \$1 million – the largest single donation from a private donor in MTC's history.

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
