Melbourne Theatre Company Artistic Director Brett Sheehy Ao today revealed MTC's 2019 Season; a feast of theatrical delights at Victoria's state theatre company.

'Making theatre relevant to 21st century Australia is the lifeblood of MTC and in 2019 we present a season of challenging, brilliant and entertaining works that speak to our times with great urgency and in ways only possible through theatre,' Brett Sheehy said.

'Amongst the suite of productions on our stages, we are especially pleased to present six terrific works by Australian writers, including the first commission from our landmark NEXT STAGE Writers' Program.'

The season opens with Alan Bennett's legendary and autobiographical, The Lady in the Van, starring stage and screen legend Miriam Margolyes, directed by Dean Bryant.

Melita Jurisic plays the irrepressible Mae West opposite Diana Glenn as Diane Arbus in the world premiere of Arbus & West by Stephen Sewell, directed by MTC Associate Director Sarah Goodes.

Iain Sinclair returns to MTC and to Arthur Miller's tragic masterpiece A View from the Bridge, to direct a new production of this visceral drama featuring **Daniela Farinacci** and **Ivan Donato**.

Esther Hannaford, Hunter Page-Lochard, Rahel Romahn and Katherine Tonkin star in the MTC and Sydney Theatre Company co-production of Così, Louis Nowra's darkly funny and deeply moving Australian classic, directed by Sarah Goodes.

The Violent Outburst That Drew Me to You by Finegan Kruckemeyer tackles the ticking time-bomb of adolescence in a smart, sweet and fiery tale about two offbeat kids at war with the world, starring Harry Tseng and directed by Prue Clark.

Kat Stewart and Peter Kowitz take to the stage in Simon Stephens's latest Broadway and West End hit, Heisenberg, turning our attention to life's intangible mysteries and the peculiarities of the human heart in an Australian premiere production directed by Tom Healey.

The timeless and much-loved classic novel, Storm Boy, is brought to the stage in an epic MTC and Queensland Theatre co-production, in association with Dead Puppet Society, directed by Sam Strong and featuring a cast including John Batchelor, Tony Briggs and Emily Burton.

The illustrious Simon Phillips directs an Australian premiere stage adaptation of the Oscar-winning film and glorious romantic comedy, Shakespeare in Love, featuring a cast including Aljin Abella and Adam Murphy.

Nicholas Bell, Jing-Xuan Chan, Josh McConville and Yuchen Wang star in the world premiere MTC NEXT STAGE commission, Golden Shield, an urgent legal thriller by rising star Anchuli Felicia King, directed by Sarah Goodes.

Nadine Garner returns to the stage under the direction of Pamela Rabe in the Australian premiere of Anna Ziegler's Photograph 51, a moving portrait of a dazzling scientist and unsung hero, Rosalind Franklin.

And the season closes in spectacular style with Kander & Ebb's Tony Award-winning Best Musical, Kiss of the Spider Woman, starring music theatre icon Caroline O'Connor, Adam Jon Fiorentino, Natalie Gamsu and Bert LaBonté directed by Dean Bryant.

'2019 at MTC is filled with stories of adventure, love, friendship, discovery and drama. We have curated a year that takes audiences on a journey around Australia and the world via the very best new plays, reimaginings of beloved classics and fresh productions of international smash-hits. Add the country's best creative talents to bring it all to life and there's no question we're in for a special year,' Mr Sheehy said.

As well as the works on stage, in 2019 MTC continues its array of renowned artist development programs and initiatives including the Cybec Electric play reading series, Women in Theatre Program, CAAP Directors Initiative and the Company's groundbreaking NEXT STAGE Writers' Program, which enters its second year with 20 writers under commission or in residency.

Through MTC's acclaimed Education Program, thousands of students across the state will be provided with life-changing theatre and learning opportunities through programming for young audiences, specialised enrichment programs, education resources and workshops.

And MTC's celebrated Sharing the Light initiative again makes theatre more accessible through subsidised \$5 tickets, MTC's Indigenous Scholarship Program and extensive regional touring of the Company's Education production.

'Through the theatre we present and the programs we provide, we aim to enrich the lives of all who come into our orbit,' Mr Sheehy said.

'As the most subscribed theatre company in the country, we are ever grateful for the enthusiasm and generosity with which our audience embrace the art on our stages. We are passionate about creating vibrant theatre for audiences of today and tomorrow and look forward to sharing another wonderful year at MTC with our dedicated theatre-going community.'

Melbourne Theatre Company opens its 2019 Season with Alan Bennett's extraordinary and mostly true story, *The Lady in the Van*, starring Miriam Margolyes (I'll Eat You Last).

Made famous by the book and film of the same name, The Lady in the Van is a bitter-sweet, moving memoir about the legendary writer himself and his very peculiar tenant who 'temporarily' parked her dilapidated van outside his London home – and stayed for 15 years.

Dean Bryant (An Ideal Husband) directs this Australian premiere production, opening on Thursday 7 February at Arts Centre Melbourne, Playhouse.

Dean Bryant said, 'The Lady in the Van is a sharp and affectionate look at a decade and a half in Alan Bennett's life when Miss Shepherd, both an irritant and a mystery, appeared and brought outsized colour and interest along with her. I can't wait to work again with the life force that is Miriam Margolyes and build this unforgettable character with her.'

In 1974 Alan Bennett befriended Miss Mary Shepherd, an eccentric, cantankerous and rather smelly old lady. Was she a fugitive on the run? A talented pianist? A nun? Or just an old lady struggling with mental health and homelessness?

Alan Bennett has been one of the UK's leading dramatists since the success of Beyond the Fringe in the 1960s. His television series Talking Heads has become a modern-day classic, as have many of his works for the stage, including Forty Years On, The Lady in the Van, A Question of Attribution, The Madness of George III and his adaptation of The Wind in the Willows. The History Boys won Evening Standard, Critics' Circle and Olivier Awards, and the South Bank Award. On Broadway it won five New York Drama Desk Awards, four Outer Critics' Circle Awards, a New York Drama Critics' Award for Best Play, a New York Drama League Award and six Tonys including Best Play. The film of The History Boys was released in 2006. Bennett's other plays include The Habit Of Art, People, and the short plays Hymn and Cocktail Sticks (Untold Stories). His latest play Allelujah! opened at The Bridge Theatre in London in July 2018.

Dean Bryant is one of Australia's most accomplished and versatile directors. He has directed numerous productions for MTC including An Ideal Husband, Wild, Vivid White, Born Yesterday, Skylight, I'll Eat You Last and Next to Normal. Dean also worked on Macbeth, The Drowsy Chaperone, The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee (and STC season), Hitchcock Blonde and Urinetown (and STC season) for MTC. His other directing credits include Assassins, Sweet Charity (Helpmann Award, Best Director of a Musical) and Little Shop of Horrors (Sydney Theatre Award, Best Director of a Musical) for Hayes Theatre Company; for Opera Australia Two Weddings, One Bride and Anything Goes (also GFO); Once We Lived Here (London); DreamSong (Theatre Works); Straight (Red Stitch); The Last Five Years; Virgins: A Musical Threesome; and five musicals for The Production Company. With composer Mathew Frank, he wrote Green Room award-winning musicals Prodigal and Once We Lived Here. Dean created verbatim piece Gaybies (Midsumma, Darlinghurst Theatre Company) and is Worldwide Associate Director of Priscilla, Queen of the Desert - The Musical. In 1964, sassy blonde bombshell Mae West was captured on film by Diane Arbus, the most fêted female photographer of her generation. Stephen Sewell's Arbus & West contemplates what might have transpired between these two extraordinary women in a powerful rendering of beauty, regret, independence and longing.

Jennifer Vuletic (Merciless Gods) completes the cast of this intimate three-hander that opens on Thursday 28 February at Arts Centre Melbourne, Fairfax Studio.

Sarah Goodes said, 'Stephen Sewell is one of our most celebrated playwrights and has written a beautiful play filled with humour and mystery. The meeting of Mae West and Diane Arbus dives a lot deeper than each woman is expecting; their shared mistrust shines light into each woman's inner life in a way that is both exciting and terrifying.'

Stephen Sewell has won great popular and critical acclaim as a playwright, screenwriter and novelist, as well as directing for both theatre and film over a career that has spanned 30 years. He is the recipient of numerous awards and his work has been performed in most major Australian theatres and in New Zealand, the US, the UK and Europe. Stephen is best known for his film and theatre work including his AFI Award-winning screen adaptation of The Boys, his role as script editor on the feature film Chopper and his numerous plays such as The Blind Giant is Dancing, It Just Stopped and the highly awarded Myth, Propaganda and Disaster in Nazi Germany and Contemporary America: A Drama in 30 Scenes. In 2016 Stephen made his film directorial debut with Embedded. Stephen is currently the Head of Writing for Performance at NIDA.

MTC Associate Director Sarah Goodes last directed A Doll's House, Part 2 and The Children, which won three Helpmann Awards including Best Play and Best Direction. Also for MTC she directed Three Little Words following her critically acclaimed direction of John and Switzerland. Sarah's reputation as a leading director of new Australian and international work has been built on widespread praise and multiple award nominations. Formerly Resident Director at Sydney Theatre Company, Sarah directed The Hanging, Disgraced, Orlando, Battle of Waterloo, Switzerland, The Effect, Vere (Faith), The Splinter and Edward Gant's Amazing Feats of Loneliness. Sarah recently directed The Sugar House at Belvoir and her other directing credits include Elling, Black Milk, The Sweetest Thing, and The Small Things (Downstairs Belvoir); The Colour of Panic (Sydney Opera House); Vertigo and the Virginia, The Schelling Point, Hilt and What Happened Was (Old Fitz Theatre); and The Unscrupulous Murderer Hasse Karlson Reveals the Gruesome Truth about the Woman Who Froze to Death on a Railway Bridge (Darlinghurst Theatre Company). In 2015 she was the recipient of the Gloria Payten Travel Scholarship.

Daniela Farinacci (Glitch) and Ivan Donato (The Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui) star in Arthur Miller's tragic masterpiece, A View from the Bridge, opening on Thursday 14 March at Southbank Theatre.

Directed by Iain Sinclair (The Beast), this muscular drama's themes of family, loyalty, immigration and justice take on contemporary relevance in the world today.

Iain Sinclair said, 'A View From The Bridge is Arthur Miller at the top of his game. Visceral, lean, gut wrenching, compelling and devastating. We call ourselves modern and civilised now but Miller's masterpiece reveals that we are all bound by the same ancient codes, the same unspeakable passions and the same unsolvable mysteries that have been with us since the discovery of fire.'

In 2017 Iain Sinclair attracted a chorus of critical acclaim for his staging of this brilliant drama for Red Line Productions in Sydney. Now, he returns to MTC and to Miller's masterpiece with a brand new production for Melbourne audiences.

Brooklyn dockworker Eddie Carbone and his wife Beatrice agree to take in two Sicilian relatives - illegal immigrants trying to find work. Hardworking Marco is sending money home to his wife and sick children. Rodolpho is chasing the American dream, but finds being different makes him an outsider. When Rodolpho falls for Eddie's beautiful niece, the protective uncle must confront his own feelings and his jealous mistrust threatens to expose an unspeakable secret - one that drives him to commit the ultimate betrayal.

One of the twentieth century's greatest writers, Arthur Miller's writing earned him a lifetime of honours including the Pulitzer Prize, seven Tony Awards, two Drama Critics Circle Awards, an Obie, an Olivier and the John F Kennedy Lifetime Achievement Award. His most famous plays include Death of a Salesman, The Crucible, All My Sons and A View From the Bridge; and his most noted screenplays include The Misfits (starring his then wife Marilyn Monroe), The Hook and Everybody Wins.

lain Sinclair previously directed The Beast by Eddie Perfect for MTC. For Sydney Theatre Company, Mojo by Jez Butterworth, Blood Wedding by Federico Garcia Lorca (translation by Iain Sinclair), and Our Town by Thornton Wilder. For Queensland Theatre, Brisbane by Matthew Ryan. For Belvoir, The Seed by Kate Mulvany, Killer Joe by Tracey Letts, Beyond the Neck by Tom Holloway, and My Arm by Tim Crouch. For the Eternity Theatre, All My Sons by Arthur Miller and for NIDA, Lost Illusions by Alana Valentine. Iain has been Assistant Director to Max Stafford Clark and Cate Blanchett and holds a Masters degree from the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art and King's College London. He is currently Head of Acting at 16th Street Actor's Studio.

Esther Hannaford (Beautiful: The Carole King Musical), Hunter Page-Lochard (Cleverman), Rahel Romahn (The Principal) and Katherine Tonkin (Abigail's Party) star in Così, the darkly funny and deeply moving Australian classic by Louis Nowra.

Directed by MTC Associate Director Sarah Goodes (A Doll's House, Part 2), this Melbourne Theatre Company and Sydney Theatre Company co-production opens on Saturday 4 May at Southbank Theatre before a season at the Sydney Opera House.

Sarah Goodes said, 'Così is an Australian classic - a show within a show that explores the transformative power of music and performance. Many people have grown up watching Così either on stage or on film, or even performing in it. The opportunity to revive this play in Melbourne where it is set is so exciting - to celebrate who we are, how far we have come and to remind us of the power and importance of art in our lives.'

It's 1971 Australia and outside a nation is protesting the war in Vietnam. Inside, a cast of complete amateurs are preparing for a performance of Mozart's famous comic opera, Così Fan Tutte, even though no-one can sing, act or speak Italian. Its aspiring young director, Lewis, has just finished drama school and his first directing gig is at a psychiatric facility. What could possibly go wrong?

Louis Nowra is a prolific writer working across stage, film, radio and both non-fiction and fiction books. His plays include Inner Voices, Visions, Inside the Island, Sunrise, The Golden Age, Capricornia, Byzantine Flowers, Summer of the Aliens, Così, Radiance, The Temple, Crow, The Incorruptible, The Jungle, The Language of the Gods, The Boyce Triology and This Much is True. His novels include The Misery of Beauty, Palu, Red Nights, Abaza, Ice, Into That Forest, and The Prince of Afghanistan. Louis' two memoirs are The Twelfth Of Never and Shooting the Moon. Some of his radio plays include Albert Names Edward, The Song Room, Sydney, The Divine Hammer, Far North, Jez and The Light of Darkness. He wrote the telemovies Displaced Persons, Hunger and The Lizard King, and created the TV series The Last Resort and The Straits. His screen credits include Map of The Human Heart, Così, Heaven's Burning, The Matchmaker, Radiance, K-19: The Widowmaker and Black and White. His non-fiction works include The Cheated, Warne's World, Walkabout, Chihuahuas, Women and Me, Bad Dreaming, Kings Cross: A Biography, and Woolloomooloo: A Biography.

Starring Harry Tseng (Jasper Jones) and directed by Prue Clark (Contest), this production for teenagers, and anyone who's ever been one, opens at Southbank Theatre on Monday 6 May as part of MTC's acclaimed Families and Education Program.

Prue Clark said, 'Finegan writes from the heart and is damn funny too. I'm a big fan of his work and am delighted to be directing this gutsy and astutely observed portrait of turbulent adolescence. I can't wait to bring **The Violent Outburst That Drew Me to You** to life.'

Winner of the 2014 AWGIE for Best Theatre for Young Audiences, *The Violent Outburst That Drew Me to You* tackles the ticking time bomb of adolescence with humour and heart. Following its season at Southbank Theatre, the production will tour around Victoria and Tasmania as part of MTC's annual Regional Tour.

Connor is 16 and angry. He doesn't know why. Lately everything and everyone is annoying him. He's slamming doors, flipping desks and always fighting. But, when he takes his rage one step too far, his parents decide to leave him in the forest for a week, alone. That should sort him out. Until he meets Lotte – also 16, also angry – but maybe just the friend Connor needs.

Renowned internationally as a leading figure in theatre for young people, **Finegan Kruckemeyer** has had 84 commissioned plays performed on five continents and translated into eight languages. He is committed to making strong and respectful work for children, which acknowledges them as astute audience members outside the plays, and worthy subjects within. In 2015 MTC presented an award-winning production of his play, *The Boy at The Edge of Everything*. He has received 35 awards including the 2017 Mickey Miners Lifetime Achievement Award (for services to international theatre for young audiences), the 2015 David Williamson Award for Excellence in Australian Playwriting, six AWGIE Awards, the 2012 Helpmann Award for Children's Theatre and 2010 Rodney Seaborn Award. He is currently a board member of the Story Island Project promoting youth literacy and empowerment through storytelling with the state's most marginalised young people.

Prue Clark is a Melbourne-based theatre director and an alumna of MTC's Women in Theatre Program. She recently directed Emilie Collyer's critically acclaimed *Contest* and is currently in rehearsals for a new devised work *All That is Right* at Monash University. She has made two works with writer/performer Emma Hall; *Ode to Man* and *We May Have to Choose*. The latter earned awards for Best Director and Best Theatre at Auckland Fringe, three Melbourne Fringe awards, and two Green Room nominations. Other directing credits include MTC's Cybec Electric season 2018, *Reasons to Stay Inside* (Melbourne Fringe, Roola Boola Children's Festival); *Dropped* (Melbourne Fringe, La Mama Theatre) and MKA's *Group Show* (Darebin Speakeasy). Prue has received two Green Room nominations for Best Director (*Reasons to Stay Inside* and *Dropped*). She has assisted directors Susie Dee (*Savages*), Richard Murphet (*Eddie Goes to Poetry*) and Lee Lewis (MTC's *Hay Fever*). In 2012 Prue completed a Postgraduate Diploma in Directing at the Victorian College of the Arts and was the recipient of an Orloff Family Charitable Trust Scholarship for Excellence.

Tom Healey said, 'As the erstwhile king of "in-yer-face" gritty British modernity, Simon Stephens transfigures his familiar themes into an ode to the possibility of transformation. *Heisenberg* is about staring down loneliness, defying convention, and the high-voltage rush of leaping into uncertainty. I am super excited to be working once again with my long-standing colleague, and one of Melbourne's finest actors, Kat Stewart, on this exquisite, life-affirming jewel of a piece.'

Turning his attention to life's intangible mysteries and the peculiarities of the human heart, Tony and Olivier Award-winning playwright **Simon Stephens** (*The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time*) applies the prominent Heisenberg Uncertainty Principle of quantum physics to personal relationships and dares us to embrace the magic of the unknown.

At a bustling London train station, 42-year-old American Georgie kisses the neck of a much older Englishman, Alex. This electric encounter thrusts two perfect strangers into a fascinating and unlikely relationship, part friendship, part love-affair. But is Georgie really all she seems?

Tom Healey's directing credits include American Song and Jumpers for Goalposts (Red Stitch); Let's Get it On (room 8); Doris Day – So Much More Than the Girl Next Door (Boldjack); Disarming Rosetta (Hothouse); Turns (CDP) with Nancye Hayes and Reg Livermore; Good Evening (Token) with Shaun Micallef and Stephen Curry; the world premieres of Falling Petals, The Fat Boy, Insouciance and Elegy (Playbox); Helpmann Award-winning The Man In Black (Folsom Prison Productions); The Kid (Griffin Theatre Company); The Spook (Malthouse Theatre); The Shape of Things (Red Stitch and national tour); and Eddie Perfect's solo shows, Drink Pepsi, Bitch (Malthouse Theatre, Sydney Opera House, Edinburgh Fringe, Melbourne International Comedy and Adelaide Cabaret Festivals) and Angry Eddie (Chapel Off Chapel, Melbourne International Comedy Festival).

Simon Stephens is a prolific British playwright whose work has been produced extensively around the world. His adaption of Mark Haddon's novel *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time* won the Oliver and Tony Awards for Best New Play and premiered in Melbourne in 2018 presented by MTC and Arts Centre Melbourne. In 2015, *Heisenberg* opened at Manhattan Theatre Company in New York, transferred to the Friedman in 2016 and opened in the West End in 2017. His many other plays include *Song from Far Away, Pornography, Punk Rock, Bluebird, Herons, Country Music, Motortown, Harper Regan, Sea Wall, Carmen Disruption, and Birdland* (which had its Australian premiere at MTC in 2015). Other credits include adaptations of Chekhov's *The Cherry Orchard* and Brecht and Weill's *The Threepenny Opera*. In 2017 his plays *Nuclear War, Fatherland*, his English language version of *Obsession* and his new adaptation of *The Seagull* all opened in theatres around the UK. Simon is Artistic Associate at the Lyric Theatre and Associate Playwright at the Royal Court.

What follows is a remarkable journey of discovery that will change his life forever.

Tom Holloway is a multi-award-winning playwright whose work has been staged extensively both in Australia and around the world. In 2016, MTC staged his adaptation of *Double Indemnity*, also directed by Sam Strong. His adaptation of *Storm Boy* won the 2014 AWGIE Award for Young Audiences. His plays include *And No More Shall We Part* (2010 AWGIE Award for Best Stage Play and 2010 Louis Esson Prize for Drama), *Forget Me Not, Beyond The Neck* (2007 winner AWGIE Award for Best Stage Play), *Red Sky Morning* (2007 R. E. Ross Trust Development Award, 2009 Green Room Award for Best New Writing) and *Love Me Tender*. He was librettist for operas *South Pole* and *Make No Noise* for the Bavarian State Opera. Tom is currently under commission as part of MTC's NEXT STAGE Writers' Program and the Bavarian State Opera.

Sam Strong is currently the Artistic Director of Queensland Theatre and has previously been the Chair of Circa, Associate Artistic Director of MTC, Artistic Director of Griffin Theatre Company, Literary Associate at Belvoir, and the founding Dramaturg in Residence at Red Stitch Actors Theatre. His recent productions have included Jasper Jones, Twelfth Night with songs by Tim Finn, and Once in Royal David's City. He has directed productions for Queensland Theatre, MTC, STC, State Theatre Company of South Australia, Black Swan State Theatre Company, Belvoir, Griffin Theatre Company, Red Stitch and Sydney and Melbourne Festivals. Sam has won Best Direction of a Mainstage Production at the Sydney Theatre Awards, and has received multiple nominations for Best Direction and Best Play at the Green Room Awards, the Sydney Theatre Awards, and the Helpmann Awards.

An ode to theatre itself and life on the stage, this new MTC production featuring a lavish musical accompaniment and a cast including **Aljin Abella** (*Aladdin*) and **Adam Murphy** (*The Drowsy Chaperone*) opens on **Friday 19 July** at Arts Centre Melbourne, Playhouse before travelling north for a season at Canberra Theatre.

Simon Phillips said, 'This is a real treat. *Shakespeare in Love* is far and away my favourite romantic comedy – unsurprisingly, given that it combines the work of two of my favourite playwrights: William Shakespeare and Tom Stoppard. It deliciously mixes the rudimentary stuff of life – comedy, passion, music and mayhem – with the more cerebral pleasures of wit and literary allusion. And given how much I enjoy the challenge of transferring films to the stage, the chance to work on Lee Hall's excellent adaptation, with a cast of Melbourne's finest character actors, is an absolute gift'.

Shakespeare in Love won seven Oscars in 1998 when Gwyneth Paltrow and Joseph Fiennes stole audiences' hearts on screen. Now, **Lee Hall** (*Billy Elliot*) has brilliantly transformed **Tom Stoppard** and **Marc Norman's** Academy Award-winning script into a lively stage comedy with a stirring love story at its heart.

Young Will Shakespeare has a bad case of writer's block and desperately needs a muse. His new comedy, *Romeo and Ethel the Pirate's Daughter*, is less than inspired and he's running out of time to deliver his next masterpiece. That is, until he meets Viola, and a real-life *Romeo and Juliet* story starts to take hold. But Viola has a secret, and this damned Romeo play is turning out to be nothing like the comedy the Queen demanded.

Internationally renowned director **Simon Phillips** was MTC's Artistic Director from 2000–2011. Over his 30 year history with the Company he has directed an impressive number of productions, with his recent MTC credits including *Macbeth*, *North by Northwest*, *Pennsylvania Avenue*, *The Importance of Being Earnest*, *Hamlet*, *Songs for Nobodies*, *Richard III*, *The Drowsy Chaperone* and *August: Osage Country*. His production of *Muriel's Wedding The Musical* premiered at Sydney Theatre Company in 2017 receiving widespread praise and multiple awards. In 2015, Simon directed the award-winning Australian musical *Ladies in Black* for Queensland Theatre which went on to have a highly successful season with MTC in 2016, followed by a commercial tour in 2017. Throughout his career Simon has also worked for many other arts organisations nationally and internationally including the State Theatre Company of South Australia, where he was Artistic Director from 1990–1993. On the commercial stage, his productions include *Dream Lover*, the 2016 Australian tour of *The Beast* as well as *Priscilla Queen of the Desert*, *The Musical*; Andrew Lloyd Webber's *Love Never Dies*, and *Eat Pray Laugh* – Barry Humphries's farewell tour, all of which have had various international seasons. Simon has won seven Green Room Awards and five Helpmann Awards.

Sarah Goodes said, 'Golden Shield is one-part thriller, one-part human drama about translation and how we communicate amongst the overwhelming hum of the digital world. Reading Felicia's brilliant play, I was captivated by its investigation of cross-cultural values and philosophies of our information age, while the bilingual characters illuminate the frequently fraught lines of human interaction. It is an astounding new play by a very exciting new voice.'

It's 2006 and less than 10% of China is online. The Chinese government looks to Silicon Valley to protect its citizens from the unfiltered chaos of the internet, resulting in the construction of an epic firewall called the Golden Shield. With American companies actively working to build it – stifling political debate in the process – are they responsible, or just doing good business? Anchuli Felicia King is a multidisciplinary artist of Thai-Australian descent who works primarily in live theatre. In 2018, her play *Slaughterhouse* was part of MTC's Cybec Electric play reading series and she was awarded a commission through MTC's NEXT STAGE Writers' Program. Felicia is interested in linguistic hybrids, digital cultures and issues of global urgency. She is a member of EST's Youngblood Group, Ars Nova's Play Group and Roundabout's Space Jam Program. Currently based in New York, Felicia has worked with a wide range of companies and institutions, including Punchdrunk, PlayCo, 3LD Art & Technology Center, Roundabout Theater, 59E59, Ars Nova, the Obie Awards, The Builders Association, Ensemble Studio Theater and Red Bull Theater. She also works with companies such as Playwriting Australia, Sydney Theatre Company, Belvoir Theatre, Yellow Earth Theatre (London), House of North (Berlin) and SHIFT Festival (Shanghai).

MTC Associate Director Sarah Goodes last directed A Doll's House, Part 2 and The Children which won three Helpmann Awards including Best Play and Best Direction. Also for MTC she directed Three Little Words, John and Switzerland. Formerly Resident Director at Sydney Theatre Company, Sarah directed The Hanging, Disgraced, Orlando, Battle of Waterloo, Switzerland, The Effect, Vere (Faith), The Splinter, and Edward Gant's Amazing Feats of Loneliness. Paige Rattray said, 'Black is the New White is a play that comes along once in a lifetime. It has been an incredible privilege to work on. The cast are ridiculously talented, as well as being hilarious and Nakkiah is a downright genius. We are very lucky to have her writing for our stages.'

Charlotte Gibson is a lawyer with a brilliant career ahead of her. As her father Ray says, she could be the next female Indigenous Waleed Aly. But she has other ideas ... she's in love. The thing is, her fiancé, Francis Smith, is not what her family expected – he's unemployed, he's an experimental composer ... and he's white! When the families come together for Christmas, the stage is set for a riotously funny struggle for dominance where insults fly, secrets come flooding out and sacred cows of all descriptions are mercilessly skewered.

Paige Rattray is currently Associate Director at STC. Prior to that, she was Queensland Theatre's Associate Artistic Director. Directing work for STC includes Black is the New White, Australian Graffiti, Power Plays and Boys will be Boys. She worked as Dramaturg on The Golden Age and Assistant Director on Speed-the-Plow, Arms and the Man, Battle of Waterloo and Travelling North. Paige was Richard Wherrett Fellow at Sydney Theatre Company in 2015-2016, is co-founder of independent theatre company Arthur, was the 2011 Resident Director at Griffin Theatre Company as well as its 2010 Affiliate Director. Other directing credits include Scenes From a Marriage, Hedda, Switzerland (QT), Bright World, The Sea Project, Return to Earth, The Myth Project: Twin, The Mesh, The Midlands, Dirtyland, Cut Snake (Arthur), and Heartbreak Hotel (Griffin Theatre Company).

Nakkiah Lui is a writer/actor and Gamillaroi/Torres Strait Islander woman. She was a co-writer and star of ABC's *Black Comedy*. She has been an artist in residence at Griffin Theatre Company (2013) and was playwright in residence at Belvoir from 2012–2014. In 2012, Nakkiah was the first recipient of The Dreaming Award from The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island Arts Board of the Australia Council. The same year, Nakkiah was also the inaugural recipient of the Balnaves Foundation Indigenous Playwright Award. In 2014, Nakkiah was the recipient of the Malcolm Robertson Prize and a Green Room Award for Best Independent Production. Most recently, Nakkiah won the NSW Premier's Literary Award 2018; Nick Enright Prize for Playwriting for *Black is the New White*. Nakkiah co-hosts the BuzzFeed podcast series, *Pretty for an Aboriginal*, with Miranda Tapsell and has appeared as a regular guest on *Screen Time* on ABC. Her latest six-part comedy series, *Kiki & Kitty*, premiered on ABC Comedy in 2017.

Nadine Garner (Di and Viv and Rose) returns to the stage in the Australian premiere of Anna Ziegler's Photograph 51, a delicate exploration of sacrifice in the pursuit of science, love and a place in history.

Opening on Thursday 7 November at Arts Centre Melbourne, Fairfax Studio and directed by Pamela Rabe (Jumpy), Photograph 51 is a moving portrait of the brilliant British scientist, Rosalind Franklin, who became an unsung hero in the race to capture the 'secret of life'.

Pamela Rabe said, 'I love science. I love thrillers. I love forgotten history. And particularly the forgotten stories of women who have changed our world. Rosalind Franklin should be a household name - she was a key contributor to one of the greatest discoveries of modern times. But because of the era she lived in, working with singular focus and meticulous skill in a field dominated by men, she paid a price. I can think of no one better to embody her ferocious intelligence, independent spirit and prickly integrity than Nadine Garner, and I look forward to audiences being beguiled by Rosalind's story. This beautiful, delicate play invites us to put her back in the picture.'

Rosalind Franklin was one of the great scientists of the 20th century. In 1952 she used X-ray diffraction photography to examine the intricate structure of DNA, but her trail-blazing work was never recognised. The scientific establishment at King's College, London simply could not cope with her genius, her self-confidence or her stern disregard for authority. Threatened by her brilliance, Rosalind's rivals scandalously stole her research and were awarded the Nobel Prize for discovering the double helix.

Anna Ziegler is an award-winning playwright who received London's WhatsOnStage award for Best New Play in 2016 for Photograph 51. It was selected as a Best of the Year play by The Washington Post and The Telegraph. Her play Boy was nominated for the 2016 John Gassner Award by the NY Outer Critics Circle. In 2017, Williamstown Theatre Festival, Manhattan Theatre Club and Geffen Playhouse premiered her play Actually (winner of the Ovation Award in Los Angeles for Playwriting of an Original Play), and Roundabout Theatre Company produced The Last Match. Geffen Playhouse will produce her new adaptation of Antigone in 2019. She currently holds commissions from Roundabout Theatre Company, Geffen Playhouse, Second Stage Theater, Seattle Rep and Grove/Whitman Productions.

Pamela Rabe has directed Jumpy, Solomon and Marion and Elling for MTC; In the Next Room or the Vibrator Play, Elling, and The Serpent's Teeth: Citizens for STC; and Porn.cake for Malthouse Theatre. As an actor, she has appeared for MTC in more than 40 productions including The Children, The Cherry Orchard, His Girl Friday, Hamlet, Boston Marriage, God of Carnage, Things We Do for Love, Dinner, Blithe Spirit, The Beauty Queen of Leenane, A Little Night Music, and Private Lives. She has performed for most major theatre companies in Australia, notably in ten productions as a founding member of STC's Actors Company, including The War of the Roses, The Lost Echo, and Mother Courage and Her Children. Her other STC productions include The Cherry Orchard, Holy Day, Three Sisters, and The Ham Funeral. Most recently, she has appeared for Belvoir in The Glass Menagerie and Ghosts, and for Malthouse Theatre in The Testament of Mary.

Adam Jon Fiorentino (Aladdin), Natalie Gamsu (Mary Poppins), Bert LaBonté (The Book of Mormon) will star alongside Caroline O'Connor.

Dean Bryant said 'I've been dreaming of building this thrilling musical with the incandescent Caroline O'Connor as Aurora, the ultimate cinematic vision of song-and-dance glamour. This musical has the electricity of Kander & Ebb's biggest hits; *Cabaret* and *Chicago*, while being a heart-wrenching tale of human survival.'

Based on the 1976 novel by Manuel Puig, *Kiss of the Spider Woman* has been adapted into a play, an Academy Award-winning film and Tony Award-winning Broadway musical. In a dark South American prison, two very different men share a small cell. Valentin is a Marxist revolutionary who refuses to betray his comrades. Molina is a gay window dresser who distracts himself by escaping to a fantasy world of movies starring the glamorous diva, Aurora. Valentin can't stand Molina's cinematic fantasies but eventually, as they share their visions for a better life, they develop a deep bond.

Kander & Ebb were an American song writing duo made up of John Kander and Fred Ebb who worked together for more than 40 years, from the mid-1960s to the early 2000s. They are responsible for the scores for many successful musicals and films including Cabaret, Chicago, Woman of the Year, Kiss of the Spider Woman, The Happy Time, Zorba, Seventy Girls Seventy, Steel Pier, Funny Lady and New York, New York. In 1991 they were inducted into the Theatre Hall of Fame in New York.

Terrence McNally is a highly regarded American playwright, librettist and screenwriter whose works often draw on the theme of how people connect and fail to connect. He won a Tony Award for Best Play for *Master Class* and *Love! Valour! Compassion!* and a Tony Award for Best Book of a Musical for *Kiss of the Spider Woman*. His love of music saw him collaborate on other musicals including *The Rink* and *Ragtime*.

Dean Bryant is one of Australia's most accomplished and versatile directors. He has directed numerous productions for MTC including An Ideal Husband, Wild, Vivid White, Born Yesterday, Skylight, I'll Eat You Last and Next to Normal. His other directing credits include Assassins, Sweet Charity (Helpmann Award, Best Director of a Musical) and Little Shop of Horrors (Sydney Theatre Award, Best Director of a Musical) for Hayes Theatre Company; for Opera Australia Two Weddings, One Bride and Anything Goes (also GFO); DreamSong (Theatre Works); Straight (Red Stitch); The Last Five Years, Virgins: A Musical Threesome; and five musicals for The Production Company. With composer Mathew Frank, he wrote Green Room Award-winning musicals Prodigal and Once We Lived Here. Dean created verbatim piece Gaybies (Midsumma, Darlinghurst Theatre Company) and is Worldwide Associate Director of Priscilla, Queen of the Desert – The Musical.



NEXT STAGE WRITERS' PROGRAM

MTC's NEXT STAGE Writers' Program is a \$4.6 million investment in Australian writers co-funded by the foundations and donors of MTC's Playwrights Giving Circle and Melbourne Theatre Company.

Through increased resources dedicated to commissioning, workshopping and developing plays, NEXT STAGE allows MTC to both build on existing and foster new artistic relationships over the long-term and on a scale that was previously unattainable.

It is the most rigorous playwright commissioning and development process ever undertaken by the Company, and has set a new benchmark for play development in Australia.

Now in its second year, there are 20 writers under commission or in residency as part of the program, and in 2019 the first commission to be produced will take to the stage as Golden Shield by Anchuli Felicia King receives its world premiere.

MTC EDUCATION PROGRAM

Melbourne Theatre Company's award-winning Education Program enables thousands of young Victorians to access first-class productions and learning opportunities each year. The comprehensive program provides students with unique insight into professional theatre practice, enriching their creative lives and inspiring the next generation of theatre-makers.

MTC Education supports the theatregoing experience for students with complementary Pre-Show Talks, Education Packs, and a growing body of online educational content. Specialised MTC Education programs include the Betty Amsden Youth Scholarship Course, MTC Ambassadors, Regional Enrichment Program, high school work experience, tours of MTC HQ, curriculum-based workshops for students and professional development seminars for teachers. For the past two years MTC has partnered with Distance Education Centre Victoria to run a Year 8 Drama course.

MTC also produces theatre made especially for students, and in 2019 MTC's Education production is The Violent Outburst That Drew Me to You by Finegan Kruckemeyer. This production will premiere at Southbank Theatre in May 2019 before touring regionally.

SHARING THE LIGHT


MTC is passionate about making theatre accessible for all and through our Sharing the Light initiative disadvantaged students throughout Victoria and outer metro communities are enjoying greater opportunity to engage with theatre thanks to the generous support of the Crown Resorts Foundation and Packer Family Foundation.

MTC's subsidised \$5 Student Tickets and \$5 Family Tickets have been welcoming thousands of brand new audience members to the theatre, while the annual regional tour is taking our Education production to young people in regional Victoria and Tasmania. Since Sharing the Light began in 2015, 220 schools around Victoria have taken up the \$5 ticket offer, resulting in over 10,000 tickets for students to attend MTC productions. Additionally, MTC has provided travel subsidies for over 4,000 students from outer-metro and regional areas to get to the theatre.

Through Sharing the Light, MTC also offers an Indigenous Scholarship Program to help create career and further study pathways for young Indigenous people. This program takes the form of four week-long intensive workshops in the school holidays and is designed to allow participants to learn about different roles within the industry through the creation of their own performance piece.

As part of the annual program, participants are provided with the opportunity to be mentored by respected theatre practitioners; take part in intensive leadership training; access professional development workshops and coaching across a wide range of business and commercial aspects of the industry; and gain insights to the daily operation of a major performing arts organisation. MELBOURNE THEATRE COMPANY

Melbourne Theatre Company is where stories come alive. For over 60 years the Company has created exceptional theatre, sharing the power of live storytelling with generations of Australians.

Under the leadership of Artistic Director Brett Sheehy Ao and Executive Director Virginia Lovett, MTC embodies the creative spirit that Melbourne and Victoria are renowned for, bringing remarkable theatre to the fore to inspire, entertain, challenge and enrich the lives of audiences.

MTC is the state theatre company of Victoria and has over 22,000 subscribers. The Company stages over 550 performances annually and through its mainstage season, tours, education productions, public readings and other events, reaches more than 200,000 attendances each year.

MTC employs over 500 artists and industry professionals annually and is a significant contributor to artist and sector development. The range of opportunities for theatre practitioners to develop their skills and careers includes MTC's industry-leading Women in Theatre Program, Cybec Electric play reading series, CAAP Directors Initiative and secondments. MTC also collaborates with companies and artists from the independent and small-to-medium sector through NEON NEXT and other initiatives.

MTC is now in the second year of its NEXT STAGE Writers' Program, a \$4.6 million investment in Australian writers co-funded by the foundations and donors of MTC's Playwrights Giving Circle and MTC. The program addresses the need for greater investment in Australian writers through increased resources dedicated to commissioning, workshopping and developing plays. To date there are 20 writers under commission or in residency as part of the program.

MTC runs an award-winning Education Program, connecting thousands of students across the state with life-changing theatre and learning opportunities through programming for young audiences, specialised enrichment programs, education resources and workshops. In addition, the Company's celebrated *Sharing the Light* initiative, supported by the Crown Resorts Foundation and Packer Family Foundation, is making a significant impact on the lives of young people though heavily subsidised tickets, travel subsidies to get to the theatre, MTC's Indigenous Scholarship Program and regional touring, all with the aim of reducing geographical and socio-economic barriers that inhibit engagement with the creative industries.

MTC's home venue, Southbank Theatre, is located in the heart of Melbourne's Southbank Arts Precinct. Each year around half of the mainstage season is performed in the Sumner (559 seats), with smaller-scale works and other activities in the Lawler (163 seats). The balance of the mainstage season is staged at nearby Arts Centre Melbourne's Playhouse (882 seats) and Fairfax Studio (376 seats), with the four theatres enabling MTC to present works of a wide variety and scale.

MTC is a semi-autonomous department of the University of Melbourne. Approximately 56% of MTC's revenue comes from the Box Office; 13% from private donations; 8% (net of government duties) from the government; 7% from corporate partnerships; and the remaining 14% from other income such as Southbank Theatre venue hire.

Support from the private sector is increasingly vital to the sustainability of MTC and the Company is fortunate to have a community of passionate donors and corporate partners. In 2016 MTC launched its Foundation to manage and distribute all donations and bequests to the Company. The MTC Foundation is also responsible for building and managing MTC's general endowment fund to help secure a strong and artistically vibrant future for the organisation.

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
